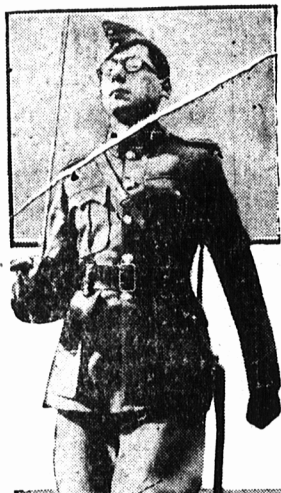

Hitler elevated Gen. Fedor von Bock to the rank of Major-General and appointed him commander of all German armed forces in Austria, following the annexation of Austria as a new province of the Reich.

Provincial police held a successful manhunt in eastern Ontario on March 26 when two Indians allegedly held up service stations and kidnaped their operators. Kenneth Haley (Lower Left), employed in the garage at Maitland, was the first to see the alleged gunmen when they arrived at his employer's station. For several hours James Tarbet and Douglas Dalgleish were forced to go with the pair. 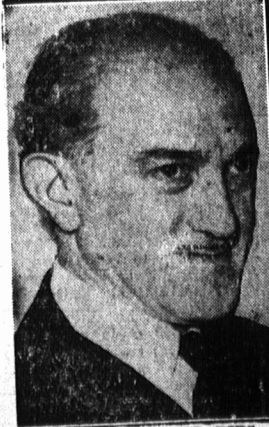
