The twenty-seventh annual session of the Nova Scotia Methodist Conference will be held in the Brunswick Street Methodist Church, Halifax, N. S., commencing at 9 a. m., Thursday June 16th. Rev. G. M. Young, formerly of this City is to be the Pastor of the Conference Church.

The ship on which the immigrants from England took passage for this province had to put back on account of an accident. She is again on her way however and due notice of her arrival at Halifax, and the time the immigrants will be here will be given through the press.

A basket social and lecture by Rev Mr Kirby, formerly of this city, was held at Hopewell Hill, N. B., recently. The attendance was large and the proceeds amounted to \$400. It is understood the receipts will close up the debt of the parsonage, which was built at Albert a few years ago at a cost of upwards of \$2,000.

There died at Hunter River on May 2nd, at midnight, Mrs W. C. Smith, aged forty-eight. She leaves a family of nine children and a sorrowing husband to mourn the irreparable loss of a very kind mother and gentle wife. An aged father, four brothers and one sister also miss her as one who was very dear to them. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Pierce of whose church Mrs Smith had been a highly esteemed member. "Dust thou art, to dust thou shalt return" was not spoken of the soul.

The following complimentary notes on the good work of the Rev Jas. Crisp will be appreciated by his Prince Edward Island friends. The Wesleyan says: At a pleasant social service, under the auspices of the W. M. S., an interesting feature was the passing of the Promissory Note, representing a debt of \$500.00 upon our parsonage. As this had been fully redeemed, it was now with appropriate rites reduced to ashes. It was observed that there were few if any mourners and the service closed with praise. With the help of the Conference Parsonage Aid Fund, \$420.00 of this amount were raised within the past eighteen months, besides \$97 for exterior painting. This valuable property in Gibson, N. S., reflects great credit upon Rev. Jas. Crisp and the Trustees, through whose strenuous efforts, the building was erected and also upon our members and friends who so nobly aided in freeing it from debt.

The death took place on the 28th ult, at the home of Robert Silphant of Hunter River, of Mrs Maud Goss, relict of the late Samuel Silphant. Mrs Silphant although eighty-three years of age was in remarkable good health until her last moments. She emigrated to this country from Bideford, England, in 1839, and married in 1844. Thirteen of her sixteen children survive to cherish the memory of a dutiful mother. George, John and Richard in Dallas, Texas; Lemuel, formerly of Summerside and now of Detroit, Mich.; Robert of Hunter River; Mrs White, Mrs Sharpe, Mrs Philpot and Mrs McEwen of Boston, Mass.; Mrs P. Martin, Manitoba; Mrs Essory, Brookfield; Mrs D. Martin, Hunter River and Mrs Jas. Stevenson, Springton. The funeral which took place on the 3rd Inst, was very largely attended, the service being conducted by the Revs G. Millar and I. R. Green. The deceased lady was very highly respected by all who had the pleasure of making her acquaintance.
