Temperance Notes have been furnished weekly to The Halifax Chronicle Herald and temperance facts are thus placed before readers, many of whom would not be otherwise reached. Among the summing up of facts regarding the provincial situation, was the statement of a Halifax alderman at a public hearing held by the Licensing Commission that the Halifax police department had told him that arrests for drunkenness had increased 89% since taverns had opened.

Another fact was that last year, the expenditure in the government liquor stores of Cape Breton Island was nearly one-half of the estimated cost of the Strait of Canso bridge. In other words, in a little over two years, they drank up the bridge financially.

WHEN WOMEN GET AROUSED

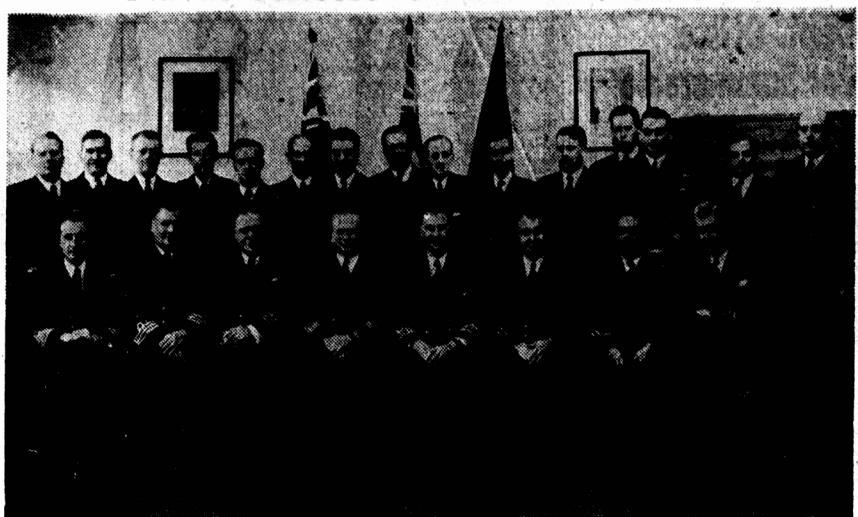
When women get aroused something happens. They can be patient and long-suffering, but when patience is exhausted it is well to run for cover. In Ontario, the so-called banner province of Canada, the patience of women with the liquor traffic has reached the breaking point—and no wonder! It is the mother who has to bear the brunt of wages wasted at the beverage room which should buy food and clothing for the children; it is the women who are humiliated by the excessive drinking of women in the beverage room and the cocktail bar.

The women are aroused. They intend to do something about it. Just what, they are not quite sure. But as a start, the Ontario Provincial Council of Women has called a Rally of Women to be held in Massey Hall, Toronto, on November 3rd for the purpose of making a "concerted protest against the inroads which the liquor traffic is making on the homes and the lives of the people of our province." In the letter sent to the Local Councils the purpose of the meeting is set out as follows: "The Provincial Council has arranged for a great mass meeting of women, which shall be in the nature of a crusade." The meeting will be addressed by Dr. Charlotte Whitton, C. B. E., Mrs. Edgar Bates, Dean of Women at McMaster University, Hamilton, Ontario, and Mrs. J. R. Fletcher, President of the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario.

The convictions of the meeting will be formulated in resolutions and presented to the Government. The Local branches of the Council, following the lead of the Provincial body, will no doubt swing into action. The women are aroused.

This should serve as a warning to the liquor barons and put an end to a lot of loose talk in the other provinces of Canada, where Ontario is being pictured as perfectly satisfied with the beverage rooms and the cocktail bars.
