HOME RUG CLEANING Rugs that have become dingy with dirt and soil can usually be cleaned quite successfully at home. First go over both front and back sides with a vacuum cleaner to remove all loose dirt. Then make a soap jelly by melting a half cup of soap in five cups of boiling water. When this is cooled, whip to a light froth with an egg beater. Use a small brush or sponge to apply the soap jelly to the surface of the rug, sponging only a small area at a time, and working quite quickly so that the rug never becomes really wet.

HOME RUG CLEANING (continued) A rubber p. t. scraper is excellent for scraping off the soiled areas. Rinse the cleaned spot with clean water until all the soap has been removed. Wipe with a clean dry cloth. When completely dry, brush lightly to bring up the nap.

THE COOK'S CORNER

NUT CROQUETTES 1 1-2 tablespoons butter 1 1-2 tablespoons flour 3-4 cup milk 1-2 cups chopped nuts 2 1-2 tablespoons green onion tops 1 teaspoon lemon juice Salt and pepper Baked crumbs Diluted egg Deep fat Method: Melt the butter and blend in flour, add milk gradually and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add the chopped nuts, green onions, lemon juice and salt and pepper to taste. Chill thoroughly and then form into croquettes. Dip in bread crumbs and then in diluted egg and then again in bread crumbs. Fry in deep fat according to directions given with the vegetable croquettes, until golden brown. Drain on unglazed paper and serve hot with tomato sauce.

BROILED FILLETS 6 quick-frozen fillets Butter Lemon juice Method: Take the quick frozen fillets from the freezing compartment of your refrigerator. Unwrap them and place them on the well-greased rack of your broiling pan. Pre-heat the broiler until it is glowing red. Spread the fillets with plenty of soft butter and then sprinkle with lemon juice. Season with salt and pepper. Place under the broiler and broil for 10 minutes. Turn after 5 minutes and broil the other side.

VEGETABLE CROQUETTES 1 cup mashed cooked carrots 1 cup mashed canned peas 1 onion chopped 3 tablespoons fat 4 tablespoons flour 1 cup milk 1 teaspoon salt 1-8 teaspoon pepper 1-8 teaspoon minced parsley 2 eggs, slightly beaten 2 tablespoons water Dry crumbs sifted Method: Mash cooked carrots and measure, then drain peas thoroughly and mash these also and measure. Make a sauce by melting the fat, blending in the flour and adding the milk. Cook, stirring constantly until thick, then add the salt, pepper and the parsley. Add the carrots, peas and chopped onion. Chill, then form the mixture into balls. Beat the eggs and combine with the water. Dip the balls into the egg mixture then into dry crumbs. Fry in deep fat heated to 390 deg. F. or until it will brown a cube of day-old bread in 40 seconds. Fry to a delicate brown and drain on unglazed paper. Serve with or without a sauce and with a crisp salad for luncheon or supper.
