ANGLO-CANADIAN (Continued from page one.) artillery and armor. The American and Canadian forces to the west and in the center, respectively, were encountering only scattered and sporadic resistance in their advance. There was nothing to indicate that the entire German-Italian garrison of Sicily was ready for a determined final stand. Advances to Allied headquarters said the Allied forces in Catania plain was expected soon. At least one-third of Sicily is in the hands of the invaders and the number of Axis prisoners taken this morning was reported to have taken more than 3,000 prisoners themselves.

Advances Everywhere - The Allied line was officially reported to have advanced everywhere in the last 24 hours. The attacking Anglo-Canadian 8th Army was faced chiefly by German troops south of Catania and the fighting in the area was the heaviest in the Anglo-Canadian sectors of the front. (The Algiers Radio, in a broadcast recorded in London by Reuters News Agency, said 8th Army tanks have entered the suburbs of Catania.)

The latest advance was facilitated by work of paratroopers who were landed three days ago in the area south of Catania and captured Primosola Bridge, seven miles from the key port city. They held it until an infantry brigade arrived. The bridge spans the mouth of three rivers flowing into the sea from the plain of Catania and is a link in the main road from Syracuse to Catania.

An Allied announcement that a joint Anglo-American military government, known as Amgot, had established its headquarters in Sicily was accepted as meaning that complete Allied occupation of the island will be only a matter of time. The American 7th Army, under Lt. Gen. George S. Patton, was reported to have taken more than 20,000 of the 30,000 prisoners in Allied hands.

Allied headquarters communication announced the capture of a third Italian divisional commander, Gen. Favero, who was taken with the staff of the 207th coastal division. Favero had been in command of a division for only 48 hours. There have been wholesale changes in Axis commanders since the invasion began July 10 and a number of Italian corps and divisional commanders have been dismissed.

Canadians Advance - The Canadians were pushing ahead toward the centre of the island after rupturing the Axis southern line of communications by the capture of Calatone and Grammichele. This advance deprived the defenders of the use of the main road from the west to Allied-held Syracuse.

Since the Sicilian campaign began the Canadians have penetrated more than 50 miles northwest from the beaches of Pachino Peninsula where they first landed. They have gone inland farther than either the British or the American forces. They have captured many towns and their fighting ability has been praised by Gen. Sir Bernard Montgomery, commander of the 8th Army.

Allies Prepare To Govern Sicily

By RELMAN MORIN (Associated Press War Correspondent) - Allied Headquarters in NORTH AFRICA, July 18 (AP) - Gen. Sir Harold Alexander, in his first proclamation to the people of Sicily as Allied military governor, ordered all Fascist party organs dissolved.

At the same time it was announced that Charles Poletti, a former governor of New York who replaced Herbert Lehmann, is in Sicily in a general executive capacity with the Allied military government of occupied territory.

Lt. Col. Bernard Bernstein, former assistant counsel of the United States treasury, assistant to the British director for public welfare, and Lt. Col. C.M. Spoford, former New York lawyer, an organizer of Amgot, who is serving in a general capacity.

The invasion of Sicily was barely a month old before Amgot had waded ashore and unlimbered for action. Amgot was so new that not even the troops had heard of it. It is composed of British and American officers who have received special training in government.

Its function is to administer occupied territories to relieve the actual fighting forces of the job of securing areas in their rear and of the same time to alleviate hardships of the native population.

While Gen. Alexander is the military governor of Sicily, Amgot itself is headed by Maj. Gen. Lord Rennell of Rodd as chief civil affairs officer. Brig. Gen. Frank J. McSherry of the United States is deputy chief.

An official announcement said Amgot had no political implications of any kind, that it would be benevolent to civilians but would destroy the influence of Fascism, abolish the Fascist Party, and make no negotiations with exiles or refugees.
