TWO WAYS OF DARNING

Lightly starch a piece of fine net and then iron it, while damp, over the hole in the linen to be mended, so that it sticks in place. Darn by hand through the mesh of the net keeping the work flat as you do so. Tack a piece of muslin on the wrong side of the tear and then stitch to and fro over it by machine. Trim away the surplus edges of the muslin beyond the darn and take out the tacking thread.
