**Political Lines Off When Capital Golfs**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Politics may be the favorite pastime of the National Capital, but it has one rival—golf.

Party lines are discarded when golf takes the floor. Witness the old senatorial foursome at the Burning Tree Club. It has grown to several foursomes now. It includes cabinet officers, senators, career officers of the government, political lame ducks and folks who are just non-political Washingtonians.

Started by Harding. President Harding, a charter member in his senatorial days, sounded the non-political keynote of the weekly gathering of the golf faithful that was to survive him. Soon after his elevation to the White House he hastened out to renew the pleasant associations of golf and breakfast with his former Senate colleagues at the Burning Tree. Said a fellow stalwart of the G. O. P.:

"Well, Mr. President, let's beat these Democrats."

"Democrats?" said the President. "There are no Democrats here. Just golfers."

Golf-and-Breakfast Group Secretary, then Senator, Kellogg was a member of the early golf-and-breakfast group. He still is. He's among the most faithful, for his State Department duties tie him close to Washington even in campaign years. And he shoots an amazingly good game. Notably a nervous man, the little, white haired dean of the cabinet, slightly bent of shoulder with much desk work, does not look athletic. But when he draws head out to go about where he desires. It is his present day lament that he is once shot the best golf in the senate, he has failed thus far to capture the cabinet championship. Dwight Davis, the War Secretary, former national tennis champion, and donor of the Davis Cup, is too young and too husky for him. Davis and Secretary Jardine are among the golf-and-breakfast devotees as are Senators Hale of Maine, Butler of Massachusetts, and Harrison of Mississippi, and former Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska.

**BRITISH DERBY ENTRIES.**

Three hundred and fifty entries including eight by A. K. Macomber of New York, already have been made for the Derby of 1928. Colts for this famous race are often entered even before they are born. King George has nominated two horses for 1928, Savonarola, a colt by Friar Marcus out of Yolande, and Gauntlet, a colt out of Neveu. The largest subscriber is the Aga Kahn, who has entered nine colts, including Feridoon, the colt by Harry On out of Eurie which was bred at the national stud. French nominations are larger than usual.

Other large subscribers include Sir Abe Bailey with nine, six of which are by his Cesarewitch winner, Son-in-Law, James A. de Rothschild with nine, and Lord Glasfey and J. B. Joel with eight each. Lord Astor, who so often has gone close to winning the race without actually achieving the feat, has entered six. Only six fillies have been entered.

**PORCUPINES ENDANGER PACIFIC COAST TIMBER**

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 7.—The "fretful" porcupine now has Uncle Sam camping on his trail.

The biological survey of the government is after the needed creature because of destruction of timber as it has been found the porcupine is fond of eating green bark. One animal frequently has been observed to girdle 25 young trees in a day.

An extensive study of the animal is being made in California, Oregon and Washington to find a way to eliminate the menace to timber without harming the protected animals.

**Famous Boatbuilding Family Supplies World**

SEATTLE, Dec. 7.—Tradition has its place, even in boatmaking.

George Pocock, shell-builder at the University of Washington, is the third of his line to fashion racing craft. Crews of Oxford, Cambridge and Eton, in England, used boats built by his father and grandfather, and his own creations are afloat from Washington to Argentina.

His grandfather, Richard Pocock, who lived on the Thames near Eton, was one of the first makers of the racing shell. His father, Fred Pocock for many years boat-builder for English university crews, now creates shells for the London County Council.

**Seek Mechanical Perfection**

Mechanical perfection and skilled workmanship make the shell, Pocock says. His boats are 61 feet long, with 2 1/2 inch beams, slender, fragile and fish-like in shape. Red cedar and spruce from Washington and silk deck-coverings from Japan enter into their construction.

The shell, unlike the motor driven speed boat, must shove the water aside as it travels. For this reason the oarsmen use wheeled seats which run on brass tracks. This enables the rowers to slip forward and back, lengthening the stroke.

**Evolution Of Shells**

Before the introduction of the wheeled slide the oarsmen, wearing greased leather trunks, slid back and forth on a smooth board. Next a grooved seat, moving along glass rods, were made and finally in 1885 the present slide came into vogue.

The rowlock used by Washington was invented in France in 1903 and brought into England rowing at the Henley regatta in 1906. The tubular car, a Belgian product with a hollow loom (shaft), has been broadened in blade and doubled in strength by the Husky builder.

The Salmon King, one of Pocock's new shells, weighs 270 pounds and is held together by 5000 fastenings of brass and copper.

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
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
