FRUIT GROWING

TO BE THOROUGHLY INQUIRED INTO

OTTAWA, July 5.—The minister of agriculture has authorized a special inquiry to be made into the fruit growing industry of Canada under the direction of J. A. Ruddick, dairy and cold storage commissioner. The well known fruit grower, W. H. Bunting, of St. Catharines, has been engaged to conduct the inquiry. The report, which should be a very valuable one, will be available for the Dominion conference of fruit growers that is to be held at Ottawa some time next winter.

The investigation will be conducted with a view of securing some reliable data respecting the area and extent of land adapted to fruit growing in the various provinces; varieties of fruit which have been found to be most profitable and successful in the several provinces or sub-divisions of the same; general trend of the industry towards concentrating the production of large quantities of standard varieties; difficulties which are likely to be encountered; methods of production and marketing and possibilities of over-production, etc., etc.

Mr. Bunting will probably proceed to the maritime provinces, accompanied by his secretary some time next week. It is expected that it will require three or four months to complete the inquiry.

The excessively hot weather which has been prevailing in Eastern Ontario during the past week is very injurious to the quality of cheese shipped in ordinary cars. With a view of preventing such injury as far as possible, the dairy and cold storage commissioner advised the railway commissioner that if the number of refrigerator cars supplied to shippers, under the arrangement whereby the department of agriculture pays the icing charges, should exceed the limit fixed in the agreement, no objections will be raised by the department while the present heat continues.

GERMANY'S WARSHIP IS AT AGADIR

BERLIN, July 5.—The final object of the step taken by Germany in sending a warship to Agadir, Morocco, according to the Cologne Gazette, is an honorable and useful settlement of the Moroccan question. This is the note struck by other responsible organs, which are now most anxious to discredit any idea of territorial acquisition. They say that Germany has been trying in vain to come to an understanding regarding Morocco but the French government has evaded the issue since the advent of the now retired Premier Monis and the launching of the French expedition to Fez, and that a demonstration was necessary to make the Frenchmen talk business.

Baron Von Kiderlen Waechter, the German secretary of state for foreign affairs, has returned to Berlin which indicates that an answer from France is soon expected. In conclusion the Cologne Gazette makes reference to the following:

TOO MUCH.

OTTAWA, July 5.—The department of railways is preparing to call for tenders for the construction of a branch extension of the I. C. R. from Halifax to Guysboro county.

The survey of the line has been completed, and it is expected that the call for tenders will go out during the month.

The legislation authorizing the extension has been put through parliament this session.

To meet increasing traffic, and in anticipation of the acquisition of a number of branch lines, the I. C. R. is making a considerable addition to its equipment.

There will be a million dollars spent on improvements to the line this summer, and of this three-quarters for rail renewal.

The board of management has placed orders for five hundred additional freight cars, twelve passenger coaches (three dining cars, twelve locomotives) and three mail express cars, early delivery being required by the contractors.

Yesterday the hot wave again became more oppressive and the mercury rose to 88, the highest recorded this season.

LORD MAYOR OF DUBLIN INDEPENDENT

DUBLIN, July 5.—The controversy in the city corporation on the question of presenting an address to King George upon his approaching arrival in the Irish capital, became more acute today at a special meeting called to consider the matter.

The purpose of the meeting, however, fell through for lack of a quorum.

At a caucus of nationalist members of the corporation last evening only four of thirty-eight voted in favor of presenting an address.

The mayor announced his determination to present an address to his majesty despite the opposition.

He says that John Redmond, the nationalist leader, personally urged that a presentation be made.

The city hall was guarded by police during the day's meeting.

There was much excitement and a big crowd in the streets cheered when the meeting broke up without having accomplished anything.

The nationalist city councillors at a meeting this afternoon decided to send a telegram to King George appointing him not to receive the lord mayor of Dublin when the latter attempted to present an address. The city councillors also ordered the insignia of office placed in the hands of the city treasurer.

ELI VENEY-11 YEAR-OLD BOY IS DROWNED

ST. PETER'S July 5.—Gerald Gore, aged eleven years, of Marlboro, Mass., was drowned here yesterday morning. His mother, who is a daughter of John W. Morrison, arrived on Thursday last with her two children to spend some weeks with her parents.

Yesterday morning, about nine o'clock, the boys, aged nine and eleven, went down to the wharf of the Stewart company to their play boxes.

Gerald went on board the steamer Argus, which was moored to the wharf and while leaning over the rail, he lost his balance and sank to the bottom.

No person witnessed the accident, but the appearance of his cap floating on the surface attracted the attention of some workmen who, on searching for the boy, observed his body lying on the bottom.

It was immediately raised to the surface but life was extinct.

Mrs. Gore and family are grief stricken over the distressing fatality, which terminates in the deepest sorrow what would otherwise have been a happy home coming.
