Hollers for Help Karl Frank, above, Nazi over- lord in Czechoslovakia, is re- ported to have broadcast appeals for help as Czech patriot forces emerged in an uprising against their German oppressors.

Capture 'Man Who Made Hitler' Wilhelm Frick, one-time Ger- man minister without portfolio and Reich Protector of Bohemia and Moravia recently captured by U.S. forces in Bavaria, is probably the highest Nazi, except Ru- dolf Hess, yet seized by the Allies. Frick is said to be di- rectly responsible for the rise of Adolf Hitler. During the fam- ous 1929 putsch, he headed the Munich political police, aided the abortive revolt, protected Hitler's hoodlums and got the Putsch's five-year sentence reduced to six months. On coming to power, Hit- ler promptly made Frick Secretary of the Interior. Frick, master of Reich domestic affairs, embarked on a series of pogroms, ordering sterilization and murder of Jews, non-Nazis and other "enemies." He took complete control of Ger- man home life, imprisoning par- ents who failed to follow his decree that "children must be brought up as the state expects." When Himml- er, once his subordinate, rose in Hitler's favor, Frick lost out.

COOK'S CORNER MEAT LOAF One and three-fourths pound chuck, or round steak, 5 sausages, 3/4 cup chopped onion, 2 cups soft bread crumbs, 2 teaspoons salt, few grates pepper, 1 egg, 1-3 cup chili sauce or catsup, 1 teaspoon dry mustard, 1-3 cup chopped green peppers. Grind the beef and sau- sages and combine with the re- maining ingredients. Turn into an oiled loaf cake pan and bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for about 50 minutes. During cooking pour off the accumulated gravy. Serve with baked potatoes and baked carrots. LONDON (CP) - A new oil painting of the King by L. 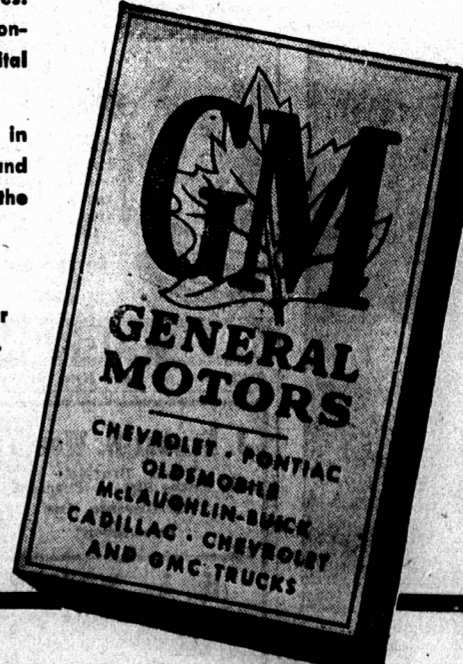
