### NEW YORK EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, April 12. — Silver shares again dominated a quiet stock market today and were able to get a little responsive firmness from some other sections of the list.

The price of imported bar silver for commercial use continued to steam ahead to new high for the past nine years with a lift of 2 1/2 cents an ounce in New York and 4 roughly similar amount in London.

The current price is nearly three times the depression low of 24 1/2 cents an ounce in 1932.

Following, as in the previous session, the price of the metal, some of the silver shares were able to get ahead substantial fractions to as much as three points each.

In today's session, however, the firmness in the silver shares communicated itself in some degree to other portions of the stock list and to the medium grade and lower priced bonds.

Among the secondary rail and utility loans a number of issues progressed 1 to 2 points and fractional other portions of the list.

Advances were the rule, the highest grade bonds, however, were barely steady and U. S. Government obligations receded mildly.

Most important stock classifica-

tions gained moderately, and the Associated Press average for 60 stocks ended 5 of a point higher at 38.1. Turnover in the stock exchange was a little better than in the previous session, amounting to 840,210 shares. Some of the rats gave an encouraging performance, and takers were available for many utilities, steels, motors and farm equipments, at slightly higher levels.

In the Canadian list International Nickel, Canadian Pacific, Noranda and Distillers-Seargams recorded fractional improvement.

Small losses occurred in Ford of Canada, "A", Lake Shore and Hiram Walker.

#### THE ROVER CREW

The Rover meeting held last Wednesday evening was an unusually interesting one. Mr. Charles East, of this city, addressed the crew and told of his experiences in the north at Port Churchill and on Hudson Bay.

He showed the crew innumerable photographs and also eskin harpoons, walrus tusks and many other interesting curios. Everyone present was astounded at Mr. East's interesting revelations of Canada's great northern seaport and all heartily thanked him and expressed their hope that he might be able to visit the Rover Den again sometime.

### Central Guardian Chief Scout Lands For Canadian Tour

LORD AND LADY BADEN-POWELL GREETED ON ARRIVAL IN VICTORIA HARBOR

VICTORIA, B.C., April 12. — As spry as any of the two and a half million Boy Scouts under his leadership in all parts of the world, Lord Baden-Powell, Chief Scout and founder of the movement 27 years ago, stepped on British soil again today. The 78-year-old Scout leader, one of the world's best known and best loved characters, stepped from the Canadian Pacific coastal liner Princess Charlotte at 1:30 p. m. with Lady Baden-Powell, head of the Girl Guides organization, their two daughters, Hon. Heather and Hon. Betty, Col. Granville Walton, head of the International Rover Association, and Mrs. Walton. They arrived from San Francisco by way of Seattle after crossing from Australia and New Zealand.

Greeted at the dock by Scouts and Girl Guides and officials of the movement including Sir Frank Burtard, of Victoria, representing the Canadian General Council; William Colway, Vancouver, executive commissioner for B.C., and Mrs. Alan Kerrill, Victoria, Lord and Lady Baden-Powell, head of the Girl Guides organization, their two daughters, Hon. Heather and Hon. Betty, Col. Granville Walton, head of the International Rover Association, and Mrs. Walton. They arrived from San Francisco by way of Seattle after crossing from Australia and New Zealand.

Noted for his part in the movement, where they are guests of Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. W. Fordham Johnson.

Seriously ill a year ago, Lord Baden-Powell showed no signs of it as he landed here. The trip, Lady Baden-Powell said, apparently was "just what he needed." They left England last October and had a busy tour to Gibraltar, India, Ceylon, the Malay Straits and the Andamans. At Melbourne, the Chief Scout greeted 11,000 Scouts from forty-seven different countries in a jamboree held as part of the Centennial celebration, while Lady Baden-Powell welcomed almost as many Girl Guides during her travels.

Nor are the Chief Scout and his co-leader finished with their travels yet. They will be touring Canada over the Canadian Pacific lines from now until May 26 when they sail for home.

### Increase In C.N.R. Traffic Business

(Special to the Guardian)

MONTREAL, Que., April 12.—A review of the passenger traffic business of the Canadian National Steamships covering the first three months of this year show an increase in passengers from Atlantic ports of 73.3 percent to British Guiana and 28.3 percent to Jamaica over the similar period of last year, according to Victor E. Eke, passenger traffic manager of the company.

"These increases are indicative of the romantic and glamorous appeal which the West Indies hold for an increasing number of people and of the popularity of our all expense cruises in which passengers have been accommodated at the best hotels during their stay at terminal points at a slight increase in cost over the regular steamship fare stated Mr. Eke.

This increased business also shows that a much greater number of people consider a longer ocean voyage of distinct benefit resulting in more time at sea and ports en route in which they can enjoy the many attractions characteristic of each colony which are so different from accustomed scenes in the north.
