The number of females with each male depends to a great extent on of the birds. If birds are confined to small quarters there should be very few with each male, the larger the quarters the more females can be used. Good results have been obtained from the heavier breeds by using one male with ten to fifteen females. In the lighter breeds fifteen to twenty-five females may be used. Each year brings new developments in the poultry industry and investigators are continually working on its different problems. In nearly every advertisement for the sale of baby chicks from reliable hatcheries we are advised that these chicks are from blood tested stock. What is meant by this? Simply that the parent stock, both male and female, has had a sample of their blood tested by what is known as agglutination test for the purpose of determining whether or not these birds are affected with bacterium pullorum, the organism that causes bacillary, white diarrhoea in chicks. This disease is started by the transmission of the germ through the egg to the chicks and also by infection, from one chick to the other. It is necessary, therefore, that adult birds carrying any germs be eradicated from the breeding stock. As there are no outward indications of the disease in adult fowl, the disease being confined to the ovaries, the only way it can be detected is by having a sample of the blood tested. All incubators and brooders with their accessories should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected when any symptoms of the disease are noticed. The disease generally shows in young chicks three days after incubation, and an accumulation of chalk-like substances gathers on the down around the vent. The heaviest mortality is met in the first three weeks and upwards of 50 per cent of the chicks will succumb to this dread disease. The chicks become listless, with drooping wings and no inclination to move or eat. Chicks may survive and grow up but are still carriers of the disease, so that all unthrifty chicks should be disposed of and the stock have at least one blood test each year. Up to the present no drugs have been found that will cure Bacterium Pullorum, but as soon as any symptoms are noticed a dilute solution of chlorine disinfectant may help check the mortality. This disease is hard to detect, for symptoms similar may be caused by too much heat, chilling, improper incubation, feeding or housing, or any cause or action that may lower the vitality of the chicks.
