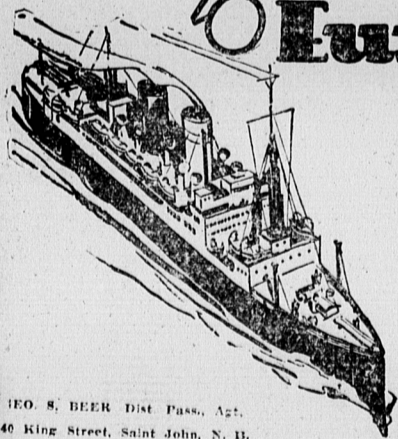

The chairman read an interesting article forwarded by the chairman of the Canadian Advisory Committee of Rotary International. It was written by the eminent essayist, Thomas Babington MacAulay, in 1830, in which he used the significant expression "A single breaker may recede but the tide is coming in." Lord MacAulay after reviewing economic conditions had alluded to what might happen in the year 1930, stating that there would likely be great progress in the course of the century along various lines. The comment on this prophecy was "that MacAulay underestimated the progress that has since been made, only serves to emphasize the soundness of his promises; a single breaker may recede but the tide is coming in."

President Palmer announced that the usual exchange of greetings at this season had been made between the Charlottetown club and other clubs.
