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## IMPORTANT MEASURES BEFORE MARITIME BOARD

sides should be granted he said when necessary to open new avenues of trade and not continued when line is firmly established on a paying basis. He did not think the Black Diamond line calling here needed a subsidy. It gives large returns to its owners. As to calling at Souris, they had drawn the subsidy but only called there twice in two years. He asked that a steamer be subsidised to run between Chatham, Summerside, Charlottetown, Sydney and Port au Basque, because between these ports there is a large trade to be developed. He set forth the advantages of this route at some length, and asked that the steamer Lady Sybil receive an additional subsidy and make Charlottetown a port of call. He complained of the three short hauls, and the advance in rates on the P. E. Island Railway, which are now prohibitive and the railway deficit is increasing in consequence. Small sailing vessels do the business which the railway loses. He hinted that the Government ought to buy out the Steam Navigation Company and take over its service. At present it can not get reasonable through rates the federal government should come to

our assistance and subsidise steamers to open up new lines of trade. His resolution was seconded by D. Nicholas and was, in motion, carried. Mr. McLean, of Port Hood presented a resolution re Port Hood Harbor improvements. This was seconded by Senator Ross and carried. The question of Inverness Railway transportation was laid over until tomorrow pending charges in the original resolution.

Weymouth Board was unrepresented and their topic was dropped. An invitation was read from the Chatham Board of Trade to hold its next annual meeting in that City. This was laid over for later consideration. Mr. W. H. Edgett, Moncton, arose and in proposing a resolution that the present time was opportune for the union of the Maritime Provinces delivered an interesting address in which he set forth some of the advantages to be gained by the proposed union. The motion was seconded by D. A. Morrison, Antigonish. The session then on motion adjourned till 8 p.m.

**EVENING SESSION.**  
Mr. Bell moved to reaffirm the resolution to prohibit the exportation of pulpwood passed at a previous meeting.

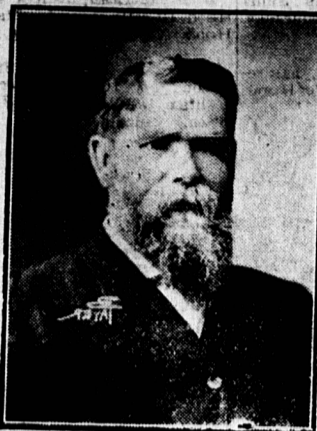
Mr. Oakes, Chatham, spoke as a manufacturer of pulp and paper and was strongly opposed to the passing of this resolution. He went into detail in this matter and invited a few remarks from Messrs Johnson, Davidson and Snowball, the latter speaker receiving well merited and hearty applause for a nicely delivered reply to Mr. Oakes. Messrs Johnson, Halifax, William, Moncton, Senator Ross and James Paton also made brief remarks. The motion was put and carried. Mr. McLean, Port Hood, moved a resolution re Railway Freight rates, which after some little consideration was moved, seconded and carried. Another motion was put and carried that a certified copy be sent to the Chairman of the Railway Commission, Ottawa. Prof. Andrews letter to the Board re effects of liquor traffic was read. On motion of Mr. Bell, Halifax, seconded by Mr. Johnson of Halifax it was carried that the report contained in Mr. Andrews' letter was granted. A resolution proposed by the Canning Board of Trade re Experimental Fruit Farms was moved, seconded and carried.

The next place of meeting was then in order and Mr. McLean, Port Hood spoke briefly advocating the favorable consideration of Chatham's invitation to the Board of Trade to hold their sixteenth annual meeting there. He moved a resolution to this effect which was seconded by Mr. Johnson, Halifax, and on being put to the meeting was carried.

The great subject of Maritime Union at this juncture was again resumed and Mr. Johnson of Halifax, took the floor. He claimed Nova Scotia had nothing to gain by the union and if such a union were ever effected it would only be to return to the original order of things when Nova Scotia (then Acadia) was a province of itself with what are now Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick as additional counties. The union would have to create a larger Nova Scotia and leave Halifax the capital of a greater province than has been foreseen for here. He touched on mineral wealth of Nova Scotia and other industrial values as compared to New Brunswick and P. E. Island, and praised her seaports, and public men. Senator Ross, agreed to union in so far as it would be a means of strength to all three and would benefit all by being one body of great value to the Dominion and said that Halifax would, of course, have to be the Capital of the United Provinces. D. A. Morrison, Amherst, thought that union would mean the total abolition of local controversies and would be a good move. J. T. Hawke, Moncton, entertained his listeners to a really delightful speech in which he claimed that union would never be effected by lingering over petty matters which were not directly to the point. He claimed for New Brunswick as bright a future as Nova Scotia is now boasting of and complimented the latter province on its really fine harbor which had been referred to by previous speakers. Mr. McLean, Port Hood, and Mr. Payzant, Halifax, each occupied the attention of the session for a short time and on motion the meeting adjourned until nine this morning.

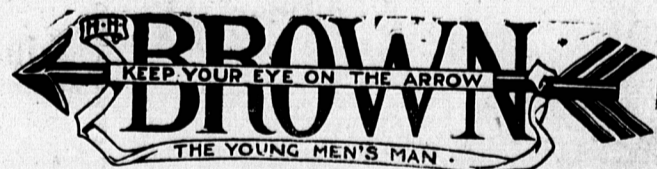
