Is Acquitted In Bent Spoon Slaying Case

MONTREAL, May 30 - (CP) - Marcel Vaillancourt charged with manslaughter in the bent-spoon slaying of Norman Stewart Milne, was acquitted today by a jury in King's Bench Court.

Vaillancourt, restaurant proprietor in suburban Cartierville was said to have shot Milne last August during an altercation over payment of 60 cents for a teaspoon which Milne allegedly bent.

Testifying in his own defence, Vaillancourt said he fired because he believed his life was in danger. He said Milne came into the restaurant about 2 a. m. Aug. 10 with his wife; Milne had been drinking. The argument arose over the spoon and Milne headed for
