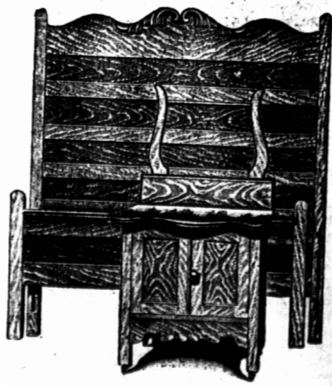

PROHIBITION IN KINGS.

In reply to inquiries from valued correspondents in King's County as to the date of the Order in Council revoking the Canada Temperance Act in King's County, a matter upon which there has been a strange lack of specific information, we may state that the Order in Council referred to was passed on 15th June last, and published in the Canada Gazette of June 23rd, 1906.

After reciting the facts that the votes of the electors of King's County were taken for and against the petition and that the petition has been declared adopted, and that thirty days had elapsed since the adoption of the petition, the Order in Council proceeds:

"Therefore the Governor General in Council is pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the Order in Council of the 1st September 1879 is revoked and that the second part of The Canada Temperance Act is no longer in force in the said County of Kings from and after the publication of this Order in Council."

This makes it perfectly clear that the Canada Temperance Act was in force in King's County till June 23rd and then went out of operation. In order to complete the record we may here cite the concluding part of section 20 of the Prohibition Act 1900, which prescribes when and how the Prohibition Act shall come into force when the C. T. Act has been abrogated:

"Section 20. . . . Provided nevertheless that should the Order in Council by which the second part of the Canada Temperance Act is brought in force in any County or Counties in this Province be at any time hereafter revoked, then this Act shall immediately on such revocation come into force and take effect in such County or Counties to which such revocation shall apply."

From all of which it follows that the Prohibition Act came into full force in King's County on June 23rd last past.

Lowell's directory gives to Montreal and its suburbs a population of 405,000, of whom 352,000 reside in the city.

It is a high tribute to the ability and judicial fairness of Hon. Frederick Peters that the Conservative Government of British Columbia has appointed him to conduct an inquiry into the charges preferred against the Public Lands Department of that Province. The appointment does credit to the Government as well as to Mr. Peters, as it assures a very thorough and impartial investigation.

A movement has been started in influential quarters in Toronto to provide by popular subscription a national memorial to the late Alexander Muir author of "The Maple Leaf Forever".

A noted French professor of medicine named Delafoy condemns the frequent practice of operating surgically for appendicitis. He says the trouble is usually caused by worms. This is a truly verminiferous theory.

Those who have complained of excessive charges on goods or parcels sent out or received by express are reminded that under the Act passed by Parliament at its recent session the Railway Commission is empowered to regulate express charges and reduce them if exorbitant. The Commission has some reputation for promptness and fairness in dealing with questions coming before it.

A lady who is a loyal subject of King Edward and who is staying at one of our seaside resorts, feels disposed to advertise for an Union Jack to fly over the Stars and Stripes at the hotel entrance. We commend her gentle protest. This is a British country, and no other flag than that of Canada or Britain ought to be displayed by British subjects except in association with our own flag.

There is a rather appalling infant mortality in Montreal. Of two hundred deaths in a week 88 were infants mostly under a year old. For the first six months of the year the births recorded were 3,408 and the deaths 3,561, or 153 in excess of the births. Of the 3,561 deaths 1,721 or nearly one half, were those of infants under five years, and of these 1,218 were under twelve months. This is really appalling.

The Russian Duma, when all the electors are completed will contain 824 members. The average age of the members is 39 years, and 181 of them never attended any kind of school, while 111 more had gone only through the lower grades. Denominationally there are 330 members of the Russian Orthodox Church, 83 Catholics, 13 Protestants, 11 Jews, 11 Mohammedans. The principal political parties are, Constitutional Democrats 133; Group of Toll 107; Antonomists 63, Octoberists 13, and 105 unclassified.

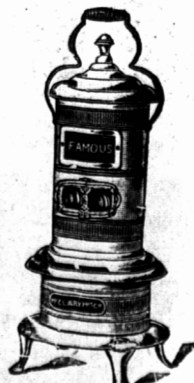
