JERSEY COW A CHAMPION, EATS MEAT

(Special to the Guardian)
VANCOUVER, June 23.—Wakili-
Kenias Fanny, a Jersey cow at
the Didsbury Jersey Farms, Dis-
bury, Alberta, has created two sensa-
tions in the dairy world, one by
its production of milk running
to 9.8 butter fat, a world record,
and the other in the revelation
that "Fanny" eats meat. The cow,
a two year old, was placed as an
experiment on a mixed ration con-
taining a large portion of ground
meat. The results have been so
startling, that Norman S. Clarke,
owner of Fanny and the Didsbury
Jersey Farms, announces that the
rest of the herd will be placed on
the same ration.

Counsel For Defense Questions Member Of Lea Government Regarding Interviews With Magistrate And Prosecutor. Questions Ruled Out As Being "Immaterial."


The prohibition case against Al-
bert McGuirk, Dromore in which
defendant's counsel endeavored on
Saturday to cross-examine the
prosecution witnesses with regard
to alleged interference on the part
of the Hon. Russell Clark, member
without portfolio in the Lea Gov-
ernment, was concluded before
Magistrate Tweedy in the Supreme
Court room here yesterday morn-
ing, the defendant being fined \$200
and costs or three months in jail.
Mr. Clark, the defendant and two
brothers of the latter were exam-
ined for the defense. All questions
bearing on Mr. Clark's alleged in-
terference in the case, his conver-
sations with John and Henry Mc-
Guirk, with the trial Magistrate
and the prosecutor, as well as the
Magistrate's alleged conversation
with the defendant's father, were
ruled out as being immaterial.
Heated argument over the admis-
sibility of evidence was frequent.
There was a tense atmosphere in
the court room throughout the
whole proceedings.

Resolution Forwarded To Premier

(Canadian Press)
ST. JOHN, N. B., June 23.—A re-
solution asking that immediate steps
be taken to rebuild the port facili-
ties at West St. John, wiped out
yesterday by fire, with damage in
excess of \$10,000,000, was passed
at a meeting of the City Council this
afternoon and was ordered for-
warded to Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime
Minister of Canada and Hon. Alfred
Duranleau, Minister of Marine, and
three New Brunswick members, Hon.
Dr. Murray MacLaren, Minister of
Pensions and National Health,
Thomas Bell, member for Saint
John-Albert, and George B. Jones,
member for Royal. The resolution
forwarded said: "That not only St.
John, but the whole Dominion had
suffered by the fire and the result
and loss of shipping facilities, in
order that the policy of using Cana-
dian ports as far as possible in
the handling of Canadian trade,
might be carried out, prompt action
in rebuilding was solicited." "The
entire future of the port of Saint
John is now at stake," said the tele-
gram.

Thornton Presents His Budget

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Ont., June 23.—First
reading was given in the House of
Commons today to a bill providing
for a loan of \$3,500,000 to the Hal-
fax Harbor Commission. The
amount is to be used for construct-
ing terminal facilities, upon the
approval of the Governor in Coun-
cil of detailed plans, etc., of such
works. Debentures of the commis-
sion are to be deposited to cover
the loan. In the committee stage,
Mr. Duranleau explained that the
money was required to complete
works authorized by the former
Government and also to complete
"unauthorized" work which had
been initiated by the former Hal-
fax Harbor Commission.
