## FROM BELGIUM

The following letter has been received from Pte. Everett C. Robertson, of Rownal, by his sister Miss Venetta Robertson, Pownal:

Machine Gun Sec, 4th Batt., 1st Brigade, B. E. F. Belgium. Rest. No. 2318.

Dear Sister:—Just a few lines to let you know that I'm well and trusting you are all in good health; also, the weather here has been nice and fine this last while back and things are very quiet, although the artillery has been doing considerable damage to the German lines. A few days ago our air craft-guns brought nine German aviators down in the rear of our lines and one I witnessed myself. The Russians are doing much better now. I think they will give the Germans a hard, long struggle this winter. It's pretty hard to tell how long this war will last and no doubt it is costing a large sum to keep it up and the loss of life is awful on both sides, but we hope and trust that the end is not far distant. The Island boys are all well at present, Louis, Warren and McLaren are here with me and getting on fine. I had a line from Charlie Hamm. He is in the 7th Battalion and only came over lately. You likely saw his letter in the Guardian. It's a long time since I heard from P. B. McRae, but I think that he is in England yet. Well, how is everyone getting along. I hope and pray that this awful conflict may soon end and that we will be spared by our Creator to return again to our dear native home. Yes, we are waiting for that time to come when the whole world will be at peace once more. History has never been able to tell us of such a terrible crisis as that which is going on now. We then, only have to bear it all in the best way, knowing that God will help us to win for we are fighting for the welfare of civilization and for our loved ones, May God protect us and help us in every time of need and may He also give comfort to those who are in sorrow and bereavement, and help them to bear the burden and give them courage. Many times I think of you all. I hope and trust that you will look always on the bright side of things and keep up your courage. Tell dear mother and father not to worry and that they may be given health and strength in the many trials and perplexities of this life. Give them my best love with kind love to all. ## FIRE ON C. P. R. LINER

MONTEAGLE DOES \$5,000 DAMAGE.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 12.—At 4.10 a. m. today fire broke out on the C. P.R. liner Monteaque, Captain Halley, at No. 1 berth, C. P. R. wharf, and it is estimated that 1,500 tons of cargo have been damaged, entailing a loss of more than \$50,000.

The fire was confined to No. 2 hold, in which was stored large shipments of cotton, cigarettes, canned goods, sewing machines and motor cars. Although the fire was under control by 8 a. m., considerable damage and inconvenience will be suffered, as the liner was booked to sail for ports in the Orient today and the date of sailing must necessarily be delayed.

To which place they have recently moved. Favorable progress is reported. The case of Mrs. Pritchard is most serious, causing much concern. Great difficulty is being experienced in getting help in the afflicted homes. Nearly all the domestic helpers have

hurriedly left town for their several homes.
