CITY AND COUNTRY

Guardian Correspondents Everywhere.

THE GUARDIAN has received a copy of the New England Journal for Investors, published in Boston. An excellent half tone-cut of Mr. William A. Brennan, Summerside is given on the first page.

The Sydney Record says:—Hugh McDonald, contractor, of this town, is starting work on a new railway wharf and freight sheds at Pictou. This work will employ a large force of men and a large plant, such as pile driving and other machinery, and will cost about \$50,000 to complete. Mr. McDonald has also under construction for the Government, a large breakwater at Summerside, costing \$100,000.

J. F. FRASER, of the Marine and Fisheries Department, Ottawa who established bait freezing stations in P. E. Island is at present in Sydney on official business. He informed the Record this morning that the department had decided to erect a detached building in connection with the Marine Hospital at Barrack Point, instead of a wing, as at first intended. The proposed new structure will contain one large ward, nurses' apartments, operating and anaesthetizing rooms, and the whole will be fitted up in the latest and most approved manner. The present building will be thoroughly renovated and used for contagious cases. —Sydney Record.

The following taken from the Toronto World indicates that Charlottetown is not the only place troubled with dust: While the sanitation of cities is steadily improving we have still much to do in getting rid of dust on the streets. During the present dry spell the City has been shrouded in clouds of dust, much to the discomfort, annoyance and health of the public. There is no doubt in the world that dust is a powerful agency for the spread of disease. The prevalence of disease in dry periods is to a large extent owing to the increased quantity of dust in the atmosphere. The use of water for the suppression of dust is the best remedy we have up-to-date, but it is still a very imperfect method for combating the nuisance. It is said that a sprinkling of a crude petroleum is more economical and more effective for laying dust than water.

THE attendance at the market yesterday was large. Dealers report that oats are firmer and 37 cents is being paid in some instances. The demand for potatoes is better and 22 cents was paid on the street. Hay is in good demand at \$10. Wheat is being bought at 65 cents per bushel. It is desirable that farmers market their wheat early in order that the flour can be consumed during the cold months of winter. Butter is worth 18 1/2 cents in round lots and it is not likely the price will go much higher as the good quality of butter which is being imported to Charlottetown from western Canada will have a staying effect upon the price of the home manufacture. Pound prints of creamy butter in large lots is quoted at 2 1/2 and the same quality in tubs about a half cent less.

A SHORT extract from a letter to a friend in this city will give the many friends of Ernest Lord a good idea of the exciting and adventurous life he is leading and he certainly seems to have plenty of opportunity to exercise his courage and to prove himself a brave soldier. "We had another fight last week, about thirty miles from here. Seventy five of us left here about seven in the evening and rode all night and came in sight of the Boers about daylight next day, when we at once opened fire on them. They had a very strong position and returned our fire heavily. We kept it up for five hours, but had then to retire with three of our men missing. I volunteered to go back and see if I could find them and managed to get one fellow's horse up to him under very heavy fire and enabled him to get out. I could not find the other two, one being a young Dutchman in our corps. It afterwards turned out that the Boers captured him and after taking his rifle and bandolier from him let him go. He managed to get back to the camp very tired and hungry. We all got back the same evening not much the worse. We have found since that we hit more than one of the enemy. None of our fellows were killed but they had some very narrow escapes. One of our boys, a corporal, had a bullet hit his saddle just as he was mounting. I hope we shall have another chance at them soon and be able to make a better show at the Boers. The wet weather has set in and it rains day and night. How much I should like to come home for Christmas, but I expect to spend mine some where on the veldt. This life agrees with me far better than an indoor life, and I am in excellent health." Mr. E. Lord is now serving as acting Sergeant Major in the Bushveldt Carbineers, in the Northern Transvaal, beyond Pietersburg—his little "shack" he calls the "Abegweli" after the far off little island, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. As the Tadians would say many sons will rise and fall ere he sees P. E. I. again.
