SOME COMPARISONS

In the Napoleonic wars, from 1796 to 1815, the largest army ever assembled was that which Napoleon led into Russia in 1812, but the number was somewhat in excess of only 500,000. The German armies, sent in 1914, against Russia on the east and France on the west, were more than six times as large as ever Napoleon's were. The greatest previous battle in history was probably what is known as the Battle of the Nations, fought at Leipzig in 1813, but the combatants on both sides in the struggle numbered only 440,000. At Sadowa, in the war of Prussia against Austria in 1866, 436,000 were engaged; at Gravelotte, in the war of Prussia against France in 1870, 300,000 at Mukden, in the Russo-Japanese war of 1905, on a front of 80 miles and lasting three weeks, 700,000. In the Great war the battle-front sometimes extended over twice 80 miles the decision on several occasions was deferred for many weeks—or, as at Verdun, for several months—and the total of men engaged on one front at times was in the neighborhood of 2,000,000; at the Marne, the total was perhaps 2,500,000.

WAR HEROES WANT AID TO THE FULL

Anything Else They Will Regard as Desertion, Says Col. C. G. Williams.

"The men's message to Canada today is 'Conscription! We must have the men! Let politicians beware of these men who are facing hell and death. They will regard anything short of aid to the full, or a shortening of the Canadian line, as desertion. Is it any wonder if they cry: 'How long, O Lord, how long?'"

With forceful vigor Lieut.-Col. C. G. Williams, preaching a stirring sermon in Timothy Eaton Memorial Church impressed upon his hearers that the Canadians in France were crying as with one voice for conscription at home. And he spoke whereof he knew, for Col. Williams has just returned from the front line trenches where he delivered a message of congratulation from Sir William Hearst. The huge church was taxed beyond its capacity, so eager were people to hear of what the chaplain had seen during his recent visit.

A Truce to Politics.

He spoke of the men who had been for seventeen and more consecutive months in the firing line without respite. Was it any wonder that they cried for a truce to political intriguing and the speedy arrival of reinforcements, he asked.

His address was based on an inscription on the monument to a fallen soldier in France, Job 28:6: "A land where stones are sapphires and dust is pure gold." The sapphires were the bodies of the gallant dead and the gold the dust which was their shroud. Graphically he described the plains of France, dotted with its thousands of crosses, and the tender care given them wherever possible. These graves stood for endurance to the end, said Col. Williams. On one cross was the inscription: "All ye who pass by, pause, and then tell England we lie here content."

Together Sir Arthur Currie and the chaplain came upon this cross during a Sunday spent three weeks ago going through some of the graveyards. The General of the Canadian forces sent his message, too, to the people at home. He said that the success of the Canadian army in France was due to the splendid gallantry of the infantry, and to unity of effort. Could this same unity not prevail at home? Then he said: "I can't let you go without telling you I firmly believe in religion. The true gospel is contained in John 3:6, 'God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten son * * *'"

The preacher told further of visiting St. Paul's Cathedral and seeing the shrines of Britain's mighty dead—of Wellington, Nelson, Roberts and Kitchener. And then again, he spoke of the dead in France and of graves he stood beside containing the mortal remains of men whose names were familiar to many of his hearers.

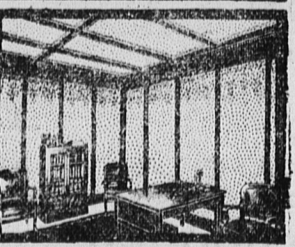
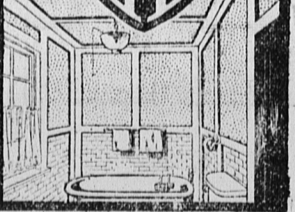
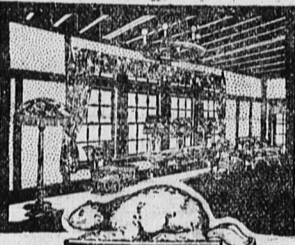


Beaver Board living room in country house pictured above. Described in Feb. 19th, Saturday Evening Post.

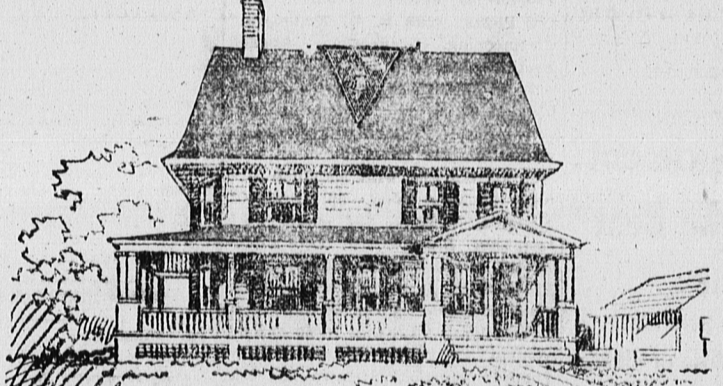
