KAISER'S NEPHEW A PRISONER (Exclusive to the Guardian) PARIS, August 30.-Count Von Zechwerin, the Kaiser's nephew is kept a prisoner.

WOUNDED WILL DISEMBARK AT SOUTHAMPTON LONDON, Aug. 29.-Virtually all the wounded men brought back to England from the front will be disembarked at the Southampton docks, and from there sent to the various hospitals in the country. Nearly all the big London hospitals, appear on the official list of hospitals which have made arrangements for the reception of wounded men. In the London area there will be established also Queen Alexandra's war hospital.

GERMANY'S PLANS (Continued from page 1) In Prussia one million men have been mobilized, since the even of the Hohenzollerns, sixty-seven millions, and this war will liberate German Austria-Masuria from the yolk of militarism; it is a war that will improve the condition of all men throughout the world. Armaments will be abolished and the immense taxation under which the whole world has groaned for building war machines will be devoted to social reform. The four greatest world powers are fighting for this ideal and are fighting for this ideal and paying a price in blood and treasure that it is appalling to contemplate.

It is the duty of the United States to participate from the view point that the result by American intervention would be incalculable. The mere fact of her joining hands with England, France, etc., would hasten peace whilst, should the United States remain passively neutral, her voice when the fight is over would have no weight in the final settlement.

America should recruit as big an army as possible and take the whole of her navy and take a hand in the general conflict for the good of the working classes the world over. It should not escape the Americans' attention that Japan is declaring war on Germany, has won the gratitude of most civilized nations, and in the event of future developments in the conflict, would not European sympathy go to the nation who joined the great arms movement to crush German despotism?

ITALY'S ULTIMATUM. (Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Aug. 29.-The Paris correspondent of the Express telegraphs: "I am informed Italy will put an ultimatum to Austria requiring an explanation of Austrian mobilization on Italian frontier. Only a brief time will be given for answer, and within a short time Italian troops are expected to be in Trieste."

PREPARATIONS ON A COLOSSAL SCALE. (Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Aug. 29.-The Daily Mail editorial says Germany has fought at stupendous odds, three to one, against the British soldiers, of whom we may feel proud; but the situation is most critical. France has done everything in her power; Austria cannot help, except by indirect pressure. Britain alone can find more men, and find them she must. The nation must prepare on a colossal scale, and must send every man and every gun that can be spared here and now to the decisive point in France.

HUGE BRITISH LOSS. LONDON, Aug. 29.-The Chronicle's Boulogne correspondent sends the following story: "A wounded soldier who has arrived here declared he was one of the thirty survivors of a British company of two thousand who were practically wiped out by the German artillery."

TWO TRAWLERS SUNK BY MINES. LONDON, Aug. 29.-An official bureau announced that two trawlers, sweeping for mines have been sunk by mines. Five members of the crews of the trawlers are missing and eight others sustained injuries.

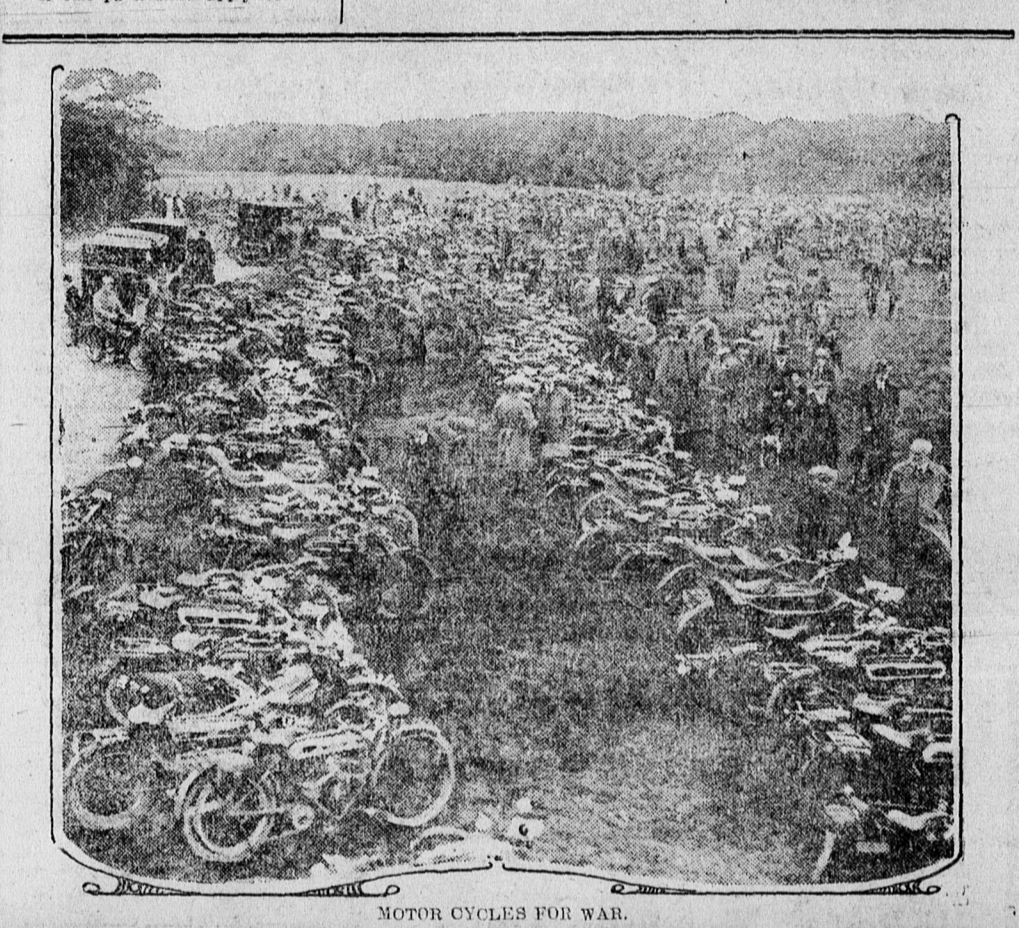
