Contract Let For New Bank Building

M.F. Schurman Co. Ltd. have been awarded the contract for the construction of a new Bank of Nova Scotia building in Summerside and work will commence immediately. This new building, which will be an important addition to the business district of the Town will be erected in a site that had been obtained on the west side of the present bank building on Water Street. This property was purchased last spring from Miss Adeline Green and the building on it was demolished. Schurman's were advised yesterday that their tender had been accepted. The building is designed according to new ideas of bank architecture and its frontage will be forty feet with a depth of 75 feet. It will be a one storey building of brick and stone construction and will be 22 feet in height. The entrance, which will be on street level, will be of curved Indiana limestone and the area above and on each side of the doors will be of plate glass so that the interior will be visible from the street. The doors are in the centre of the building and the layout inside will be a sort of horseshoe design with desks on three sides of the customers space. At the rear of the building will be a cash vault and a book vault with two storage vaults directly under these in the basement. There will be three coupon booths and a special room to ensure privacy for safety deposit box holders. There will be provision for three teller's cages of the modern low type. In the basement there will be a stationery room, staff room, wash rooms and boiler room. It is hoped to have the building completed and ready to be occupied by next spring. The new building is greatly needed as the business of the bank has expanded to such an extent that the staff of 15 are working in crowded quarters that are uncomfortable and hamper efficiency. It is expected that the present bank building will be available for purchase when the new one is occupied.
