## CHARLOTTETOWN SHORT COURSE

(Continued from page one) The use of lime was discussed and the speaker quoted the German saying "the use of lime without manure makes the father rich and son poor," and enlarged upon it to some extent showing the detrimental effect of such a dressing. Ground lime, stone or ground oyster shells are much more desirable. The cultivation of the soil and proper implements for such an operation was very ably presented by Mr. Clark who also spoke to a considerable extent on the different elements of food necessary for proper plant growth.

After a very complete discussion of the factors necessary to plant growth Mr. Clark reviewed some experiments conducted at the Experimental Farm last season. Arthur Gibson, Chief Assistant Entomologist of the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, gave an illustrated address on insects affecting orchards. At the outset Mr. Gibson spoke of the habit of insects in general, dividing the injurious forms into two classes by the value of their mouth parts, viz, biting insects and sucking insects. The biting insects are so named because they bite and chew their food, while the sucking insects take up their food in a liquid form through their hollow beaks.

For the first class an active arsenical poison like Paris Green must be placed on the foliage which will be eaten with it, and for the sucking insects some liquid which will kill by actual contact, that is one which actually hits the insect must be applied, such as kerosene emulsion. Different forms of beneficial and predaceous insects as well as insectivorous birds were fully demonstrated. Amongst the injurious orchard insects discussed were the codling moth, the white-mated tussock moth, the canker-worm, the scale insects, plant lice, apple maggot, plum curculio, palmer worm, green fruit worm, etc. In addition Mr. Gibson spoke of the work of the Federal Department in connection with the destructive insect and pest act and in particular with that part of the regulations of the act which governs the inspection of fruit and other nursery stock entering Canada from countries where the dreaded brown-tail and gypsy moths occur.

T. A. Benson, Poultry Expert, will give a demonstration in killing and plucking poultry on Saturday, commencing at 9 o'clock.

## EUROPEAN NEWS

BERLIN, Jan. 29 (Special)—The whole of Berlin was horrified to read a few days ago details which explain the mysterious discovery of two bodies behind a burned cornstack near the little country village of Buckow, ten miles from Berlin. The victims were a farmer and his wife, the prosperous owners of a farm in the village, and they had been murdered together with their servant girl, by criminals of remarkable callousness and determination. So far as can be learned, the farmer, a man named Kallies, when he went to rouse his single farmhand (said to be a Pole) on Tuesday morning, was surprised to discover him already working in the cow-house. Soon afterwards the man called him, and a few seconds later cries for help were heard from the farmyard. They ended a minute later. The farmer's wife, terrified, dressed herself hastily and went out to inquire what had happened. Her two daughters then heard the cries renewed, the voice this time being that of their mother. Stricken with terror, the children were unable to move. A little later they heard some men steal out of their place of concealment, in the farmyard and ask whether all was well, and then, receiving an assurance in the affirmative, entered the house, burst open the door of the servant's room, and overpowered and strangled the sixteen-year-old girl. Then the farmhand came to the children, who are aged six and nine respectively, and told them they had no reason to fear unless they disobeyed his instructions and made a noise or moved away. The man placed them in a big wardrobe, nailed the windows of the house fast from the outside and locked the doors.

PARIS, Jan. 22 (Special)—Antwerp has just concluded its celebrations in honor of the artistic jubilee of the great tenor, Ernest Van Dyck, one of the finest exponents of Wagner roles that has ever trod the operatic stage. An article contributed to the "Echo de Paris" by Comte Henri de Fitzjames, shows that nothing was lacking on the part of the townspeople to do honor to the occasion. The ceremonies, which lasted four days, naturally included operatic performances by the great tenor himself, who repeated his triumphs as Lohengrin on the second act of the opera, and as Tannhauser in the third act of that ever-popular work all the old dramatic power was there, united to a voice which has charmed the whole of Europe. At a reception, held at the Hotel de Ville and attended by a distinguished gathering, speeches were made felicitating M. Van Dyck on his jubilee, and recalling his more notable performances and triumphs that have now become historic.
