The youthful Murray Harbor team set the pace early in the game and for the first period a half matched the city aggregation in all departments of the game. The latter part of the second half, however saw the Wings falter and the capital city squad were quick to seize the advantage, breaking a first period 1-1 deadlock by outscoring their rivals 3-1.

In the third period play was again close, but the city squad added to their lead by sinking three counters against two garnered by the Wings. L. Herring, C. Herring and L. Irving were the marksmen for the Wings, while Flannigan, Sinclair and Kennedy tallied for the winners. The game was cleanly played and kept a large crowd of spectators in a constant state of excitement.

Here they are: Peter Voo 2:02 is the daddy of eight; Mr. McElwyn 1:59 1-4; Protector 1:59 1-4-6; Scotland 1:59 1-2-5; Gaylesworthy 2:02 1-2-4; Guy McKinney 1:58 3-4-4; Calumet Chuck 2:04-3; Spencer 1:59 3-4-3; Volomite 2:02 1-4-2; Fullworthy 2:02 and Hollywood Harkaway-1 each. Practically all of them are of the Peter the Great—Guy Axworthy cross.

Whirlwind Finish By "Jersey Jim" Sends Briton Down To Defeat

NEW YORK, Jan. 21—(AP)—Battle-scarred Jim Braddock came from behind with a gallant finish tonight to upset expectations and beat tough Tommy Farr, British heavyweight champion, in a thrilling 10 round match before a near-capacity crowd in Madison Square Garden.

The 32-year-old former heavyweight titleholder of the world, making his first start since being knocked out last June by Joe Louis, pulled the decision out of the fire after apparently being hopelessly battered and licked at the end of the eighth round.

Braddock's spectacular finish, in the ninth and tenth, not only turned the tide of battle abruptly and conclusively, but thrilled a throng of 17,369 fans who paid \$80,645.23 to see Jersey Jim stage a characteristic comeback.

Spotting his rugged rival an advantage in years and poundage, as well as an early margin on points, Braddock finished like a champion. There were no knockdowns but it was a slam-bang bout, from start to finish, and so closely fought that it took the last ounce of Braddock's courage to gain the verdict.

Farr's apparent overconfidence proved costly as the penalty that cost him the third round. Faster, younger and stronger, the British champion had gained some commanding a lead on points, due to his effective body punching, that he seemed to feel he could coast through the finishing rounds. Like almost everyone else, Farr underestimated Braddock's recuperative powers.

Jorge Bresic 212 of the Argentine won the decision from Jack McCarthy, 195 1-2, of Boston, in a six-round waged after the main event. There were no knockdowns.

Another three minutes but he did so, with a matchless exhibition of courage under pressure. Jim knew he had to take that last round decisively to have a chance. He didn't have much speed left but he sailed into Farr, outpunched the Briton at every turn, and was going so strong at the final bell that the referee had to pry them apart.

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
