ADMIRAL STURDEE HAD CLOSE CALL WHEN SHELL HIT MAST

ST. JOHN, April 13—The following letter, describing the Falkland Islands engagement, written by Lieut. R. Blake, flag-lieutenant to Admiral Sturdee, has been sent to Dr. Alex. Davidson, R. N. The letter, written by an officer who, with the exception of the admiral had the best opportunity of viewing the fight, tells how near Admiral Sturdee was to death when a shell struck the mast on which he was stationed. After telling how the German ships were sighted, the lieutenant says:

"We got out of the harbor after an hour and a quarter, and off we went after them. We got within ten miles of them at noon so slowed down to let the men have some food before the fight. At a quarter to one we went on at full speed, the Glasgow and ourselves, followed about three miles astern by the Carnarvon, Cornwall and Kent. The last three couldn't keep up the speed. At one we opened fire slowly, just trying the range, and we hit the Nurnberg, or Leipsig, I don't know which it was. Anyway she steered away and I signalled to the Kent to chase her. The Glasgow turned around too, without signals, and went after her.

We were then doing 26 knots, and closing the enemy fast, and the Dresden and the Leipzig turned away so as to let the Scharnhorst and Gneisenau fight a duel with us.

Shot Fiercely Well

clear. The Glasgow and Cornwall sunk the Leipsig, and the Kent sunk the Nurnberg. So we had a great victory.

"We were pretty badly knocked about. You never saw such a mess of twisted iron and huge holes, and the wonderful thing was that we haven't got one casualty. Commander Townsend was knocked down and has a bruised heel, that's all. It will take some time repairing the damage. We were hit 34 times by 8-inch shells, and they do make a mess of things. One of the German officers is rigged out in my old blue Norfolk jacket and an old pair of flannel trousers. Fourteen of the survivors died and we buried them at sea.

Lieut. Blake then describes how the inhabitants of Monte Video honored the admiral when he went ashore to meet the British consul and minister. The admiral was ashore from noon till six, and the people of Monte Video went mad with delight over the great victory.
