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NAZIS MAY FORCE RUSSIA TO FIGHT OR YIELD NEW DEVICE AIDS BRITISH AIR DEFENCES Showdown Seen Approaching As Plot Thickens

True Bill Found in local Murder case June Term of Supreme Court Opened Here Yesterday.

A true bill was brought in by the Grand Jury in the case of the King vs. George Albert Griffiths and Earl Land, charged with murder at the June term of the Supreme Court which opened yesterday morning with Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault presiding.

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Phillips and Lund are charged with murder in connection with the death of Peter J. Trainor, 79-year-old Charlottetown storekeeper which occurred on the night of January 30 of this year. He was found dead in a storeroom off the shop living in a pool of blood.

Three other indictments, which were on the docket yesterday, were directed to the grand jury by Mr. Justice Arsenault on motion of the Attorney General, Hon. Thomas A. Campbell. They were: The King vs. P. Frank Stacey, charged with obtaining money under false pretences; The King vs. John Jeremiah O'Leary and Ivan Lund, charged with theft of a car; The King vs. Josephine Devante, charged with concealing a stolen motor car.

Describing the blackout to the Canadian Press, Mr. Turner said, "of course it is a broader measure than that of Britain but we feel it prudent to extinguish 'sky glare' which would be a beacon for hostile ships."

He was speaking to a crowd of over 10,000 people who assembled in the bleachers, Grand Stand and along the front of the speaker's platform at the Provincial Exhibition Grounds to witness the impressive Torch ceremony.

Churchill may Receive Torch Dominion Day British raid Nazi bases for Seventh night

OTTAWA, June 17—(CP)—If Canada's Victory War Loan, 1941, for \$30,000,000 has been over-subscribed in time to permit the Victory Torch to reach London by Dominion Day, Prime Minister Churchill has agreed to receive it.
