Letter From 'Quake Zone To Dr. Clark

Earthquake Shocks Experienced At Home Of Dr. Judson F. Clark, Altadena, California, But Household Escaped Unharmed.

Word was received last evening by Dr. J. A. Clark, Superintendent of the Experimental Station, of the safety of his brother Dr. Judson F. Clark at Altadena, California.

FORMER

Thornton, K. B. E., was one of the outstanding figures in Canadian Railroad history. To him fell the task of unifying the several lines which were brought together under the Canadian National Railways.

He was appointed President and Chairman of the Board of Directors in 1922 and served in that post until his resignation in July 1932.

His condition gradually became worse until Monday night he sank into a coma from which he never recovered, the end coming this afternoon shortly before three o'clock.

He was knighted by the King and decorated by three governments for his work during the Great War. He was widely known throughout this continent and in Europe as one of the first Railway Executives of a railway age.

There was one honor in preparation for him which death prevented from receiving—a testimonial dinner by the American Federation of Labor to have been participated in by the heads of the railway unions of Canada and the United States.

The dinner was to have taken place on March 25, in New York. William Green, President of the Federation, was to preside and Sir Henry was to have been presented with an illuminated address, an event unique in the railway world and recalling the fact that Sir Henry was a life member of the Railway Union of Great Britain.

RE-OPENING (Continued from Page 1) the financial centre planned to resume its normal functions tomorrow in hope it had turned its back on the three-year ordeal of deflation.

Stock exchange commission houses received a stream of inquiries during the day, and they reported that the majority of investors were less anxious to sell than to buy, some of them with hoarded cash.

Security dealings in Wall Street today, limited to over-the-counter transactions in United States Government issues, were decidedly encouraging, as prices pushed up a point or two, in response to the favorable reception of the new issue of \$800,000,000 in four and 4 1/2 per cent treasury certificates.

Although he was born in the United States, the high marks in Sir Henry's career were in England and Canada. Brilliant successes as a railroad executive in England led to his appointment as General Manager of the Great Eastern Railway.

He was twice married, first to Virginia Dyke Blair in 1901, second to Martha Watriss in 1926. He had a son and a daughter by his first wife.

Formed Many Friendships Sir Henry was a commanding figure over six feet in height, he was celebrated for a genial manner and formed many friendships not only among the prominent men with whom he came in contact but also among the humbler servants of the transportation system.

During the war he held several important posts in connection with railway transport and was the recipient of decorations from several governments. He was made a Knight Commander of the Order of the British Empire in 1919.

SWEEPSTAKE BILL PASSES IN SENATE

OTTAWA, March 14—The Senate today endorsed the principle of sweepstakes for charity purposes if any Province desires them, when it passed the second reading of Senator A. D. McRae's bill by a vote of 37 to 19.

The bill would not bring in sweepstakes. It would, however, enable the Attorney-General of any Province to grant such permission if he so desired.
