ICE CONDITIONS.—The high tides coincident with the full moon, the first of last week, floated a lot of snow and ice which was lying on the bottom in shore all along the North Side. The coast is now clear. North Side fishermen launched their boats last Tuesday and gave them a try-out. Though the ice has left the shore there remains a lot of snow and ice along the banks making it almost impossible to get stone and rocks for trap ballast and for Kellicks (anchorage.) In many cases the lobster men had to quarry out stones in the fields. The extension for a week was needed and much appreciated. With the ice now gone herring for bait should soon show up. There being no fresh bait, fishing expectations cannot be realized to any extent until the herring strikes along shore or until vessels come with herring from the Magdalen Islands.

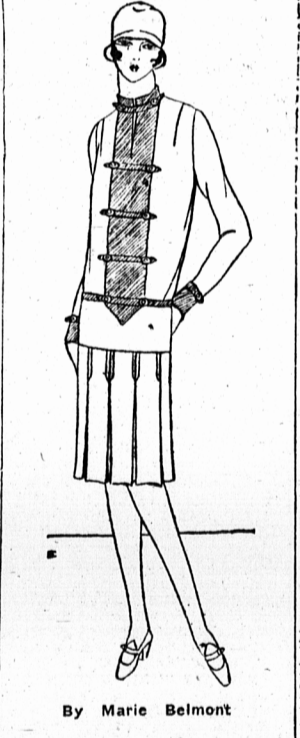

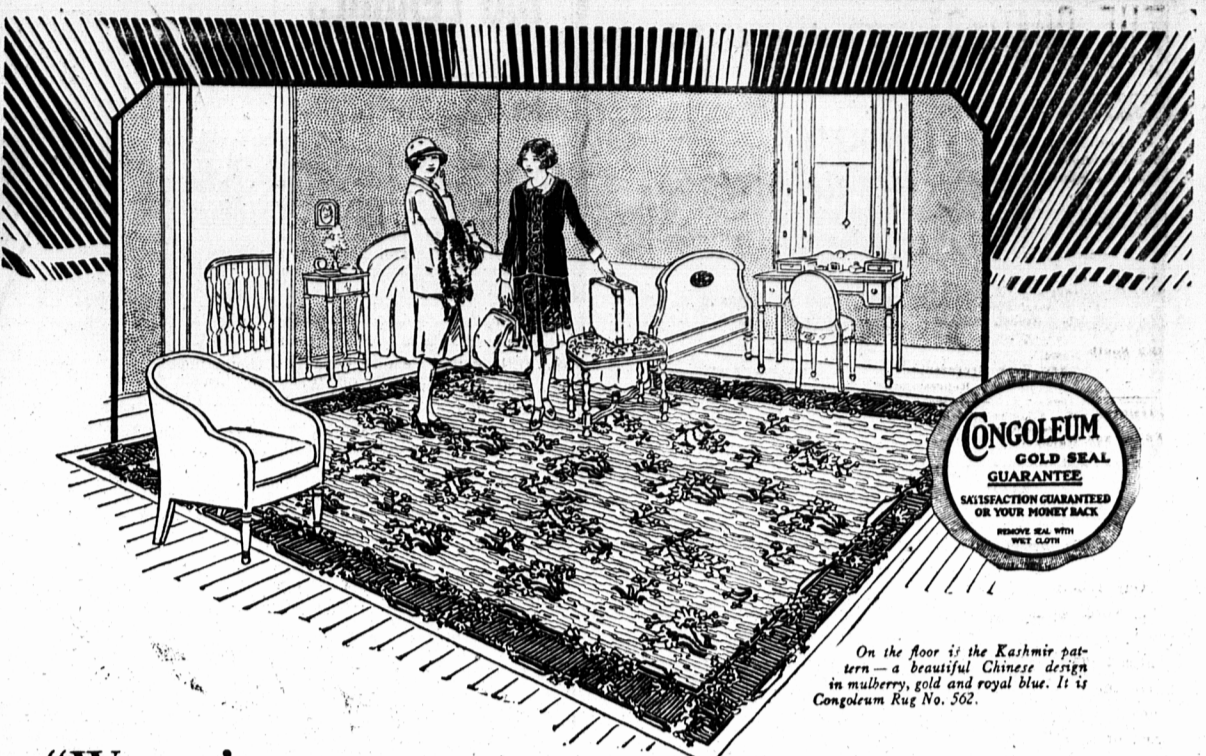

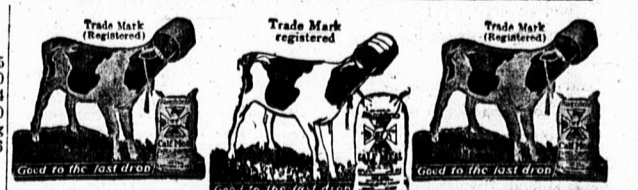
