The questions are those which have reached the Wartime Prices and Trade Board from housewives in this region. The answers are provided by the Board Readers. Persons who have intelligent questions to ask on price control are invited to send them in writing to the Women's Regional Advisory Committee of the War Time Prices and Trade Board.

Q. Is cranberry sauce still rationed.

A. No, cranberry sauce has been removed from the list of rationed commodities until August 31st.

Q. We pay our rent in advance by the month. The people who own our house have sold their's and wish to occupy ours in a period of three months. What I want to know is how long may we stay in this house, one month, three months or six months.

A. If you are a monthly tenant as it appears you are, your landlord must give you six months notice. She cannot, however, ask you to vacate during the winter months, so that the earliest that your landlord can now ask you to vacate is April 30th, 1945. The notice must be on a form supplied by the W. P. T. B. and signed by the rentals appraiser from that office.

Q. Should we have had another butter coupon on the first of June?

A. No, the next butter coupon No. 64 and 65 do not become valid until June the 8th.

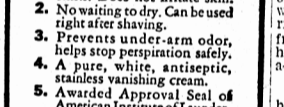

SUGARED PHRASES SPUR WIVES

Husband Must Show Appreciation Of House-keeping Or Gay Bride Will Become Sour

Why do husbands so seldom make any effort to keep up their wives' morale? Apparently the average husband thinks his wife is some sort of an automatic domestic machine that functions without any human aid and that doesn't even require to be lubricated by a little soft soap now and then. And maybe that is that reason that so many perfectly good marriages that should have lasted for years and years break down so soon and are thrown on the scrap pile.

Of course, no man admits that he regards his wife as a household gadget, but that is the way the unmanageable husbands treat the women they marry. They think they have done their full duty when they married their wives and assumed their household shopping tickets, and that nothing more can reasonably be expected of them. On the contrary, they expect their wives to go about beating upon the drum and cymbals and chanting hymns of thanksgiving to the men who took them away from mahogany decks and saw envelopes and dumped them down in kitchens, with cooking stoves and washing machines to perform upon without remuneration.

And when the wife instead of lifting her voice in a merry roundelay only uses it to nag and whine and complain, her husband is honestly bewildered. He can't understand why the gay, entertaining girl he married, who was always on her toes, has turned into this sour, complaining, fault-finding, and discontented one. They must make the wife feel that she has not even enough about her to dress herself up and keep the house clean. Still less does he realize that his attitude towards her is at the bottom of the whole trouble.

Her morale has broken down under lack of appreciation. Her husband never makes a lover-like speech to her, or gives her a kiss that isn't a peck on the cheek, so her own love withers because it has nothing to feed on. She slumps in her housekeeping because she feels that there is no sense in her making a burnt offering of herself over the kitchen stove for a man who never mentions the food unless it is to find fault with it. And she asks herself, what's the use in trying to be entertaining and amusing for a man who only grunts when she speaks to him?

Inasmuch as all men know that women are almost pathologically susceptible to flattery and that they value the spoken word more than any deed, it is strange that husbands do not realize that if they want good wives and happy and contented ones they must make the wife feel attractive. They must make it seem worthwhile. They must make their wives feel that they are, and appreciate, and are grateful for all the work they do and the sacrifices they make for them.

BAKED LEMON PUDDING

Two tablespoons fat, 2/3 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 cup lemon juice, 2 tablespoons grated lemon rind, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup milk.

Cream fat, add sugar gradually and cream thoroughly. Add the egg yolks and beat well. Add flour, lemon juice, grated rind and salt. Mix well and add milk. Pour into buttered custard cups and place in a pan of hot water. Bake for 20 to 40 minutes in a moderate oven.

LEMON PIE

One-half cup sugar, two teaspoons cornstarch, one-quarter teaspoon salt, juice and grated rind of one lemon, two egg yolks, one cup hot water, milk sugar, cornstarch and salt with the egg yolks and mix smooth with lemon juice and rind. Add hot water gradually, stirring, and set on fire. Cook until clear and thick, pour into hot pie shell, whip egg white, add two tablespoons confectioner's sugar, spread on top of pie and brown in slow oven.

TOASTED CARROTS

12 cooked small carrots 1/2 cup fine-flavored melted dripping 1 cup corn flakes, crumbled 1 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper
