**SUCCESSOR TO  
ARCHBISHOP O'BRIEN**

Next Archbishop May be a Prince Edward Islander . . .  
Names of Rev. Doctor Sinnott and Father Burke  
Mentioned In Connection With Vacant See.

OTTAWA, April 21.—There is much quiet discussion relative to the filling of the See of Halifax, made vacant by Archbishop O'Brien's lamented death. From Bourke to O'Brien the bishops and archbishops of Halifax have been of Celtic blood. There is thought to be no possibility of transference of bishops except it be Bishop Casey, of St. John, assuming, as all do, that the new archbishop is to be Irish. It is thought quite likely that he will take up the new burden, if after close scrutiny Rome feels disposed to impose it upon him. He is a young man, in the forties, and would naturally have a long term of service ahead of him.

Today some names are mentioned among Halifax clergymen for the position. The papers mention Rev. Dr. Foley, of Tusket Wedge, and Rev. Dr. MacCarthy, the late archbishop's vicar-general. The one is very young, the other rather too old. They also speak of Rev. Dr. Thompson, of Antigonish. His nationality, and the fact that he is almost designated to succeed Bishop Cameron, seem to preclude him.

If the little Island of Prince Edward should be honored again, its best known cleric, whose name is quietly mentioned everywhere, is Rev. Father Burke, well known all over the Dominion and recognized to possess the qualities for a brilliant churchman. Halifax's first prelate was Bishop Burke. A priest of the diocese said recently that if an outsider would be chosen he would rather have Father Burke than any. The Protestant community, who know him well and admire his breadth and ability, would welcome him warmly. Mention has been made, too, among others of Rev. Dr. Sinnott, the distinguished young secretary at the delegation, Ottawa. He, too, comes from the maritime provinces—Prince Edward Island.

A Roman bishop must be more than thirty, however, and it is a question whether the doctor is that old. Although not in the province of Halifax, His Lordship McNeil, of St. George's, (Nfld.), a Nova Scotian by birth and a native of Antigonish diocese, is frequently spoken of as a possible resort in filling the see of Halifax. He is half Irish, they argue, and in every particular a desirable candidate. It is hardly likely, however, that Rome will seek one so far afield.

After the suffragans—Bishop Cameron, MacDonald, Dr. Barry and Casey—have met, a choice of three names will be made—dignissimus, most worthy; dignior, worthier, and dignus, worthy, and sent to Rome. Bishop Cameron as senior bishop will preside at this meeting. Then, according to the new proceeding, the archbishops of Canada will have a vote in approval or disapproval of the candidate offered. Then the last and possibly most powerful word will be spoken by His Excellency Mgr. Sbarretti, the apostolic delegate, who personally represents the Pope in these dominions.

After all this, the Pope himself may choose any or none of the names presented. Usually, however, the dignissimus, or the list is promoted. It will be seen that Rome moves slowly, and those who thought Halifax would have a new bishop in a moment are to be doomed to disappointment.
