MOOSE JAW east in September of 1901. He was promoted to conductor in 1913. During his service with the company in that capacity he was in charge of the Prince of Wales (now Duke of Windsor) train between Swift Current and Moose Jaw, and was in charge of the pilot train which preceded the royal train of his Majesty King George VI and Queen Elizabeth between Moose Jaw and Swift Current in May of 1939. Mr. Laird was superannuated by the company December 31, 1939. Mr. Laird during his residence in Moose Jaw took a prominent part in Freemasonry. He became a Mason at Kensington, P.E.I., and affiliated with Moose Jaw Lodge No. 3 A.F. and A.M. in 1923, and was worshipful master of that lodge in 1931.

During his long residence in Moose Jaw Mr. Laird took an active part in many community enterprises. He was president of the Moose Jaw Liberal Association for a number of years, and at the general election in 1934 was elected to the provincial legislature as one of the two representatives from Moose Jaw city. He was a member of the technical education committee of the Moose Jaw school district for a number of years.

As chairman of the legislative committee of the Order of Railway Conductors for a number of years, Mr. Laird gave excellent service to his fellow employees. He was awarded the King's Jubilee Medal in 1935.

Mrs. Laird was prominent in various organizations of Zion Church, and for many years was treasurer of the Young Women's Christian Association. In their new home at Victoria Mr. and Mrs. Laird will become members of the already substantial number of former Moose Jaw citizens now residing in the British Columbia capital. The following is section 35 of the By-law to Regulate and Control Traffic in the City of Charlottetown:—
'It shall be unlawful for the driver of any vehicle to park such vehicle on any street or public place for a period of time longer than two (2) hours between 2 o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock A. M. except in such areas as may be indicated by the police by reason of their being continuously necessary for the travelling public.'
Any person violating this section of the By-law will be dealt with accordingly. L-178.
