George W. McCready, C. E. who died at his home in Moncton on Wednesday last, was the eldest of five sons. He was born in 1827 at Upper Sussex, now Penobscus. He had a passion for study, notably in mathematics, astronomy, and science generally. In early life he taught school, and while the settlement of the Province was going on was appointed Deputy Land Surveyor for King's County. Later he was appointed Resident Engineer on the construction of the Intercolonial. He afterwards held a like position on the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway. He shared in engineering on the St. John water works, was for a time Secretary of the Moncton Cotton Company, and for a considerable term of years was City Engineer of Moncton. He lived a blameless life and was a close student of Scriptures, for the best understanding of which he acquired a knowledge of Greek and Hebrew. His researches in astronomy and chronology attracted the attention of the Royal Chronological Society of England which conferred on him the title of Fellow of that distinguished body—some years ago. He was a frequent contributor to the press on scientific and religious topics. Four sons and three daughters, also a sister and brother survive him.
