Roy Holman, who has won the honour of being elected to the highest office in the order is receiving the congratulations of his friends in Charlottetown. Mr. Holman arrived home last night, the representatives from the province having arrived the previous night.

At the annual convention of the Charlottetown district of the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church held last evening at Cornwall Mrs. Geo. E. Full, Superintendent of the Charlotte-town District presided and a very interesting address was delivered by Dr. M. M. Manderson, return-

ed medical missionary to China, who spoke of the educational, evangelistic and medical work accomplished in recent years in that country. The superintendent and ignorance of the great mass of the Chinese people was illustrated very clearly by the speaker who had many strange experiences and stories to relate to emphasize the need of greater missionary activity there. For one trained doctor there are half a million people in China and the need in this field of endeavor is very urgent.

Referring to the present political unrest in China, Dr. Manderson said she had frequently been asked what will be the outcome. Nobody can tell this; it may continue for five or ten years or even longer. The need is for some great, far-seeing, Christian leader who will have the confidence of the people and the good of the country at heart. In the meantime the eight provinces may establish independent states of their own. The outstanding need is certainly great statesmanship.

The national consciousness today is being aroused in China and never before. There is a far-reaching student movement on foot and glorious opportunity confronts the Christian mission movement in taking the initiative and spreading the Gospel among the young people of both sexes. For centuries China was very much in the background but the great awakening is in progress and never before in history has such an opportunity come to Christian people. Today China is wide open to evangelistic effort and mission activities there have already won the confidence of the people and prepared the field for the sowing.

Dr. Manderson spoke fully on the subject of mission and medical training schools established in China and of the splendid work which is being carried on in the medical education of women. It is in the womanhood of the country that the greatest potentialities lie. The speaker had been a teacher in one of these schools and with much earnestness and eloquence, she concluded with an appeal for united and immediate action along educational and missionary lines at a time when China is prepared for the greatest enlightenment as never before.

The meeting was well attended and Dr. Manderson received a very interested and appreciative hearing. The following are the officers for the ensuing year: Superintendent, Mrs. G. E. Full, (re-elected); Assistant Superintendent, Mrs. Bradford; Secretary Treasurer, Mrs. Stoddart, (re-elected).

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
