THE FATAL DEFICIENCY

The School Room of the Baptist Church was crowded again last night to hear Rev. L. E. Ackland preach a moving sermon on "The Fatal Deficiency." It looks as if the meetings would soon be crowded out of the School Room into the main auditorium of the Church. Some took a stand for Christ, and it was a meeting of mingled power. The preacher's text was: "And Jesus looking upon him loved him and said unto him, one thing thou lackest." Mark 10: 21. He said: One of the wonderful traits of the Master's character is His unerring insight into the nature and needs of men. His judgment was never at fault. He never had to change His opinion of men as we do. "He knew what was in man." He neither underestimated nor overestimated their worth. In our judgments of each other we sometimes see only some outstanding talent or virtue, and all that that talent or virtue can do for us. We are blind to our own faults and deficiencies. More often we see only a single fault that hides for us all the existing virtues and graces. This was not true of Jesus. He weighed men in the perfect scales of His unerring judgment. Herein lies the inestimable value of Jesus' friendship. He shows the faults and weaknesses of our character and would correct them. He never fails in that appreciation which stimulates their virtues. When Jesus saw the young ruler He loved him with a love of appreciation for his manhood's worth.

I. In this personal interview between Jesus and the young ruler we may discover the qualities which Jesus admires. We see moral uprightness, cleanness of heart and life. That young man could look into the searching eyes of Jesus Christ and say, "All these commandments have I kept from my youth. Yet he had a sense of incompleteness, an ambition to be better than he was, therefore he came asking, "What lack I yet?" He was no moral trifle but in deadly earnest, came to Jesus "running" in his eagerness, and was not to be deterred either by a sense of his own dignity as a ruler or by the presence of the crowd. Further he had a great respect for Jesus, believed in Him as a teacher and a moral guide. He came even in the spirit of humility "kneeling" before Him in deference to the Master's fame and power. Here was a man who could appreciate true manhood when he saw it incarnated in Jesus, a man who recognized its supreme worth and desired to possess it. What fault could be found with such a life as this? It seemed complete.

II. But the Christ looked into that soul and saw its fatal deficiency. One thing thou lackest. He was living for self. He lacked the passion of devotion to a noble cause. He was like a well-built engine, complete in every part, nothing omitted, nothing slighted, but without the fire and water to make steam. There was no driving force, and without it the engine is only a useless pile of junk. The measure of devotion is the measure of the man. How much pressure do you exert in your neighborhood for the suppression of evil and the advancement of good? Don't be content to live a negative life; be good but be good for something with all there is of you. Many a man prides himself on the evil he has done. By that test a marble has not fallen, he has no weakness or falling and has done no harm, but he's only a dead thing after all. The indispensable qualification for genuine manhood is a passionate devotion to a noble cause. This driving power for life's great tasks, whence

It will be not only interesting, but of vital importance to hear what Dr Garrison will have to say on this question, with which his professional duties for some years past have made him familiar.

Reports of officers, on the work of the past year, including the report of Miss DeBolis, Dispensary Nurse, will be given and citizens will be given an opportunity to hear of the splendid work this institution is doing quietly and unostentatiously for the benefit especially of the poor. Every citizen can help in this great work at least by their presence at the annual meeting this evening and by learning what they can of the necessity that is being done and of the necessity of doing still more.

The meeting opens promptly at 8 o'clock, and it is hoped the hall will be filled.

ANNUAL MEETING P. E. I. TELEPHONE CO.

The annual general meeting of the shareholders of the P. E. Island Telephone Co. was held at the head office of that Company at 8 o'clock last night.

The President's address showed that very substantial gains were made in the business for the year just closed, a net gain of 437 installed telephones having been made over the previous year; the revenue showing a proportionate increase.

A large amount of construction and reconstruction work was done during the year, including a new toll line from Marshallfield to St. Peter's, and a new Exchange opened at the latter place; a new switchboard at Murray River; the exchanges of Souris, Montserrat and Mt. Stewart were rebuilt; extensive cable changes were made in Summerside and Charlottetown, besides a number of new exchange and rural lines built in the various parts of the province. Nearly \$20,000 worth of new plant was added during the year. Quite a large quantity of new construction work is contemplated for the coming year, among which will be changing the present grounded line from New Haven to Searletown to a metallic line; reconstructing Alberton exchange; new switchboard, etc., for Summerside, and replacing the present equipment in two of the smaller offices with more modern equipment and opening up a new exchange. The old board of directors was re-elected as follows:—

MISSIONARY MEETING AT ST. JAMES' CHURCH

(Continued from Page One.)

entered Pictou Grammar School, then went to the Academy, passed on to the study of theology under Dr. Thos. McCulloch, the only professor the Presbyterian Church then had. While a faithful student, Geddie never disingenuously carried the message of salvation to heathen lands. While at college his health failed and it seemed that he would have to give up the ministry. Again he solemnly dedicated himself to the Lord and vowed that if his health were restored he would carry the message of salvation to heathen lands.

Licensed by the Presbytery of Pictou, May 1837, 22 years of age. One old father solemnly dissented from his licensure. In March 1838 he accepted a call to Cavendish and New London, P. E. I., in the hope that his way might be opened to fulfil his vow. Here he laboured faithfully, not only in his own congregation, but throughout the whole Presbytery, showing as great zeal and earnestness in the work of home missions as he was afterwards to show in the sphere which he had already devoted to his life. He at once formed a missionary society in the congregation and regularly sent contributions to some society for the propagation of the Gospel among the heathen, meanwhile uniting in his efforts to stir up the little band, then constituting the Presbytery, to a deeper interest in the heathen. In 1839 he married Charlotte, daughter of Dr. Alexander Macdonald, of Antigonish. This union was entered into under a solemn promise that if the way opened there was to be devoted to foreign mission work. His first missionary societies were formed in all the congregations of the Presbytery, and in 1840 they sent a united contribution of £17, 11s. to the London Missionary Society. If you may see a day of small things, but when you remember that there was almost no ready money on the island, the whole trade being conducted by barter, and remembering too the comparative poverty of the people you may readily multiply it by 20 to enable you to form some idea of what it really meant.

Geddie now began to urge upon the church the duty of sending out a missionary of their own. His proposal was received with almost ridicule by a church of about 30 congregations, with about 5,000 members, the congregations mainly rural, most of them struggling, none wealthy, only one minister's salary reaching \$800 and most of them in arrears. It did seem a hopeless task. The first man to give him whole soul support, a man venerated, and worthily so, in Prince Edward Island, was Rev. Dr. John Keir, of Princeton congregation, a man of the finest spirit, who in true missionary enthusiasm had devoted his life to preaching Christ in these provinces.

At Presbytery Sacramental gatherings, wherever it was possible, addresses were given and plans talked over. Of course strong opposition was encountered. Geddie tells us that at the close of a meeting held in one of the most intelligent congregations in P. E. Island, a man came up to him and put the question: "Sir, what is a missionary?" Gradually it began to be felt that if the whole church would do as well for foreign missions as P. E. Island it might be possible to send a man yet. Geddie proceeded to lay the matter before the whole church. In the winter of 1842 he published a series of letters in the "Presbyterian Banner," the organ of the Church, setting forth the claims of the heathen, and the possibility of sending out a missionary.

These letters were widely read and it was now determined to test the feeling of the Church in a formal way by introducing to the Synod an overture urging that immediate steps be taken to engage in a mission in some part of the heathen world. Dr. Keir introduced this overture in 1842. It is worthy of note that the overture was crowded out by what was then deemed more important business till the last day of the Synod.

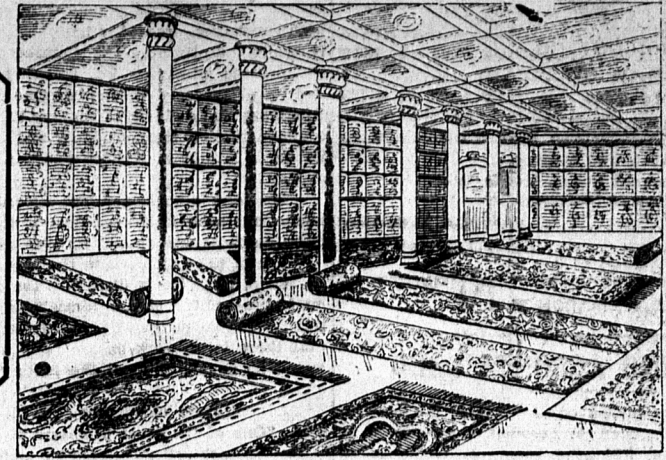
After an interesting description of Dr. Geddie's missionary efforts, Mr. James concluded.

In February 1866 Dr. Geddie and family sailed from Halifax for Liverpool, thence for Melbourne, where they reached in 114 days. September 5 they again landed at Annetym. Geddie laboured on till 1872, when on June 14 he was stricken with paralysis. He was taken to Geelong, Australia, for treatment, and then, on December 14th, in his 53th year, he passed to his reward. He was buried December 16 in the Eastern Churchyard, Geelong, where a suitable monument marks his resting-place.

But his noblest monument is Annetym and the simple slab in the church there, which records the fact: "When he landed in 1842 there were no Christians here. When he left in 1872 there were no heathen."

serve his King and Country, and they trusted he would be spared to return to the island when they promised him a more rousing welcome even than that of their Godspeed. (Applause.) Captain McKimmon in reply thanked Mr. Brown and the company for the references made to what he had done for horse-racing, and also for the handsome memento with which they had presented him. He appreciated their kindness very much and would remember it as long as he lived. He was satisfied that the war was not nearly over yet, and a great many of them would still have to go to the front in defence of King and Empire. Wherever fate might send him, whether in Belgium, France or Germany, he would always wear that wrist-watch and whenever he looked upon it, he would think of the many kind friends and associates of the Charlottetown Driving Club with whom he had spent so many pleasant hours.
