Another Storm
Brewing In Egypt

(Special to the Guardian)
LONDON, April 2. — Another
storm is brewing in Egypt in the
opinion of the Cairo correspondent
of the Sunday Express who says
that officials fear a grave crisis
when the Egyptian reply to the re-
cent British note becomes generally
known.

The reply was in response to in-
timations from Great Britain
that certain Egyptian legislative
measures would endanger public
security and the home government
reminded Egypt that because that
country had rejected the recently
proposed treaty it was back to the
situation it occupied in 1922.

The Express correspondent un-
derstands that the Egyptian reply
demands complete independence,
the right to defend the Suez Canal
with an Egyptian army without any
assistance from the British army or
navy forces unless Egypt calls for
help, and also that Egypt be re-
garded as no longer in any way a
member of the British Empire but
as an ally on an equal footing with
Britain.

The declaration of 1922, upon
which Great Britain is now relying,
terminated the British protector-
ate over Egypt and declared that
country independent, but the British
retained the right to defend
Egypt against all foreign aggres-
sion, to defend the canal, and to pro-
tect foreign residents and interests
generally.

The figures for 1927 are not yet
available but the subject will be
greatly reduced due to the German
competition of mixed bent grasses
lowering the market price in North
America.

In 1926 Dr. M. O. Malte, formerly
Dominion Agrostologist for our Ex-
perimental Farms, now Chief Bot-
anist, National Herbarium, Ottawa,
confirmed the identification at
Georgetown of some eight acres of
Velvet Bent Grass (Agrostis canina)
in a very pure condition. This grass
is the most valuable of all turf for-
ming grasses and is used chiefly for
putting greens. The areas mention-
ed are believed to be the largest
source of pure velvet bent grass
known. The seed from this plot was
valued at \$2.00 per pound and was
retained for seeding purposes in this
Province by the Grass Seed Grow-
ers Association. I had time I
would like to tell you about creos-
ting bent (Agrostis stolonifera) the
best grass to sow or propagate by
cuttings for bare spots on a lawn
or course.

Alfalfa.
Just a word to say that the dis-
ease of alfalfa which prevented us
from making any progress in breed-
ing hardy strains here has appar-
ently disappeared. I have not seen
any evidence of it now for two
years. We now have fair fields of
this clover on several of our Illus-
tration Stations. We are sowing five
pounds of alfalfa with our regular
grass and clover mixtures for hay
on all of these stations.

Meteorology.
For I dip into the future far as
human eye could see.

One of the great desires of our
race is to see into the future. We
strive to know and understand the
great laws of nature for on them we
can build forecasts and even measure
our probable error. Then by im-
proving our methods we can cut
down the probable error until it
nearly approaches the vanishing
point, the zero of calculus. In this
way the astronomers have calculat-
ated the movements of the heav-
enly bodies with great accuracy. When
they tell us that an eclipse will be-
gin at a certain moment at a nam-
ed point, Atlantic Standard time,
we not only expect it at that mo-
ment, but time and again we have
noticed that the prediction was ver-
ified to a fraction of a minute.
Using this type of calculations,
known as biometrics we have been
able for a number of years to fore-
cast from the mean temperature of
the month of March in each year
the probable yields of field crops
during the following season in P. E.
Island. A high mean March tem-
perature and an early spring has
been followed by greatly reduced
crop yields. A low mean March
temperature has been followed by a
late spring and yields of farm crops
above average. Saturday night I
worked out the data and applied
the methods referred to. The mean
temperature for March 1928 was
26.032 degrees Fahrenheit. This was
slightly below average and would
indicate average spring conditions
and our usual good crops through-
out Prince Edward Island.

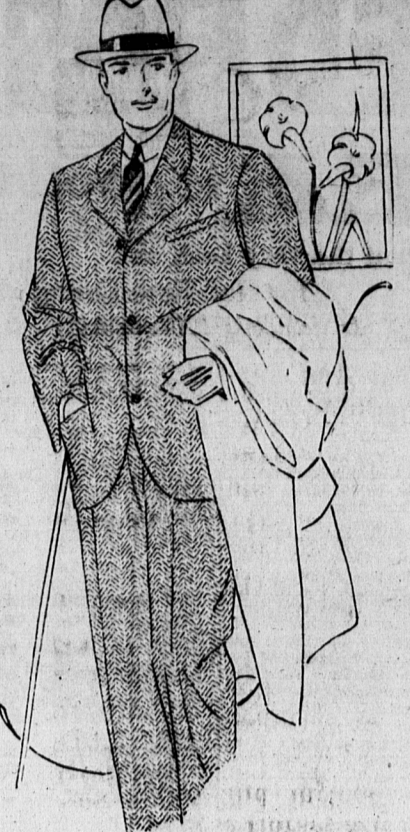
