second of a series of children's books written and illustrated by Hendrik William Van Loon. The first was "Around the World With the Alphabet," in America the best selling juvenile of 1935.

"The Songs We Sing" contains the words and music of twenty-five songs and each song is illustrated with a four colour, full page Van Loon painting.

The songs in the book—"just about everything you sang when you were a child and would like your child to sing too"—include "Alphabet Song," "Au Claire de la Lune," "Cuckoo Calls from the Wood," "Farmer in the Dell," "Frere Jacques," "Hickory Dickory Dock," "If All the World Were a Little Like You," "I Love Little Pussy," "I Saw Three Ships," "Jack and Jill," "King of France," "Lady Bird," "Little Boy Blue," "Little Jack Horner," "Little Nut Tree," "London Bridge," "Miller and the Baker," "Mulberry Bush," "North Wind Doth Blow," "Rock-a-bye Baby," "Row, Row, Row Your Boat," "Sleep Baby Sleep," "Spring's Arrival," "Sur le Pont d'Avignon," "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star."

Each song in this book has a completely new piano arrangement by Grace Castagneta. "Grace Castagneta," writes Hendrick Van Loon the author, "plays the harp" chord so well that I quite often suspect her of having learned her wondrous craft from Johann Sebastian Bach himself, but she says 'No'.

You can't keep him a baby until he is 21 and then expect him to know the things a man should know and have the judgment a man should have.

Certainly a father makes a great mistake who holds his son up to ridicule or censure of others and who complains to outsiders of the boy's shortcomings. It destroys the lad's self-confidence and give him an inferiority complex that is a handicap to him as long as he lives, and in addition it blights the boy's reputation. Many a boy gets the name of being wild, or lazy, or unreliable from his father's peevish fault-finding when he is nothing of the sort, and the father's complaints were only venting his spleen because the boy had different tastes and ideas from his.

It is a pity that parents in these days cannot realize that being over-strict with their children gets them nowhere, and that when they deny them the freedom and the privileges that other youngsters of their age have, they simply do the things clandestinely that they would prefer to do openly. When the door is locked on them the answer is that they climb out of the window, which is bad for all concerned.
