COMPENSATION FOR PRISONERS
TORONTO, Feb. 16 (CP)—United States citizens who were interned or captured by Japanese armed forces during the Second World War can obtain compensation from the U.S. Government for time spent in internment camps, the U.S. consulate here said today. The compensation, which ranges up to \$50 for every month spent in Japanese hands, applies to U.S. citizens now resident in Canada. They or their dependants or heirs can obtain forms for claims from U. S. consular offices.

ARSON EXPOSE, "FLAMING FURY" BRINGS SEARING REALISM TO SCREEN
Exploding on the screen with searing realism and violence as blazing as its title, Republic's "Flaming Fury" begins a three day engagement at the Empire Theatre Thursday.

Present scales range from \$32 a week to \$52 a week.
