else a Moderator. The name succeeding Mr. Lockhart for Moderator by rotation was the Rev. J. A. MacLellan, who was unanimously elected to the Chair. The Clerk, Rev. Geo. Christie was re-elected by a unanimous vote.

The Clerk read a list of the different items of business as contained in the docket, which showed a long bill of fare for the Reverend fathers and brethren. It was agreed that with few exceptions the docket as read be taken up and duly considered.

A communication was read from Rev. Robert Laird, D. D. in regard to the Jubilee Celebration of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

It was agreed that the name of Rev. W. H. Spencer be transferred on the consultant roll of St. John Presbytery to the P. E. I. Presbytery where he had given thirty years of excellent service. Mr. Spencer has retired from the active ministry and is now residing in Charlottetown.

Mr. Carson was asked and granted that the congregation of St. John's and Cavendish be allowed to dispose of their Manse properties as they were not suitable.

It is understood that the Cavendish Congregation will build a more modern Manse, probably located at New Glasgow. Advice was asked of Presbytery in regard to the site of proposed Manse and it was agreed that Messrs. Gillis Miller and Staver be a committee to co-operate with the congregation and report at May meeting.

The forenoon session closed at a quarter past one and adjourned to meet again at half past two in the afternoon.

The first speaker at the afternoon session was Rev. H. D. Raymond of St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, who was invited to speak on behalf of the Bible Society, explaining the memory work by the Bible Society, awards are being offered by the Bible Society to the different Churches which encourage the memorizing of Scriptural Selections. Every effort is made to cooperate with churches in drawing up a programme that shall be helpful in the instruction of the youth in the word of God with its rich gems of sacred truth.

Rev. G. Miller moved, seconded by Rev. John Stirling that a vote of appreciation be tendered Mr. Raymond for presenting this subject to the Presbytery. Rev. J. W. MacKenzie and others supported his work and commended the work of the colporteurs.

St. James' Basilica Damaged By Fire

MONTREAL, March 2.—St. James' Basilica, the Catholic Cathedral in the west end of the city here, was threatened with destruction yesterday morning when a fire which may have been caused by oil flowing from a heating system pipe, broken during the earthquake on Saturday night, caught in the furnace room ceiling.

Only the presence of mind of the engineer of the building in turning the oil flow by a safety valve and good work by the firemen prevented the flames from spreading to the church proper.

As it was the smoke penetrated the church and the many persons who had already gathered there, for the 8 o'clock mass were forced to leave. Damage is estimated in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

There was considerable time given to the discussion of Ordination practices, a question arising as to whether the session many of whose members' resignations were laid on the table, were still able to function as a session. It was agreed that the session whose resignation has not yet been accepted, shall hold office. There are some points of procedure which have been open for discussion in regard to taking of the vote.

According to the Presbyterian Church law only communicant members have a right to vote on Church Union and disposal of Church property except where special local acts of incorporation confer upon all those who are supporters of the Church the right to vote. The Presbytery heard the Clyde River case and regarded the action of the session and minister there as quite regular and legal, and expressed great regret for letters in the press reflecting on the action of the minister and session.

The session of Alberton asked that associates be appointed to assist in the carrying on of the work here, which request was granted.

Notices were also read from congregations voting non-concurrence on Union question. A report of votes so taken must be reported not more than one week after ballot has been held.
