Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

FROM present indications turkey will call for a big figure at and before Christmas. The local market is very poorly supplied at present and there is little likelihood of any improved condition before the holiday as reports from all outside districts are to the effect that poultry of all kinds is very scarce and that the present supply will be greatly diminished prior to Christmas. It is now expected that turkey will be quoted at 30 cents per pound at Christmas time, that chickens will bring \$1.50 per pair and fowl about one dollar. The market yesterday was well supplied with beef and the price was reasonable, good quality being offered at seven and eight cents and some as low as five cents. Vegetables and the general run of garden truck are quoted at the usual figure.—St. John Sun, 16th.
