the redistribution of Seats Bill introduced in the State Parliament of West Australia. The measure gained the hostility of the Labor members of the House and they resorted to obstructionist tactics in order to delay its passage. For twenty-nine hours they kept the House sitting, delivering speech after speech and were obliged to give up. During the progress of the sitting six members of the Labor Party were ejected. One of the services of the police was requisitioned to remove him from the Chamber. The speaker at times was so great that the speaker was reduced to a state of helplessness. Finally the Labor party withdrew from the House in a body, and progress having been made with the Redistribution Bill, the Assembly rose. The Bill will be carried into law in spite of the opposition of the Labor members.

MONTREAL WILL BORROW \$7,500,000

MONTREAL, Jan. 16.—Three municipal loans amounting to \$7,500,000 were authorized today. One provides for the borrowing of \$3,000,000 for the construction, establishment and maintenance of an underground conduit system; another of \$1,500,000 for the establishment of a water filtration plant, and the third of \$3,000,000 to increase the working capital for street paving, sewer and sidewalk laying. The loans will be forty-year issues bearing interest at 4 per cent.

MESSINA REBUILDING

MESSINA, Sicily, Jan. 16.—The rebuilding of Messina in durable masonry was inaugurated today when the corner-stone of the group of public buildings to be erected in the municipality was laid by the Minister of Public Works and other members of the Government. The ceremony was witnessed by a great assemblage, and aroused much enthusiasm and new hope for the future. The weather was spring-like, the sun shone brightly, and the city was the gayest since it was destroyed in 1908. The buildings are built of stone and concrete. The ministers go from here to Reggio where there will be a similar ceremony, formally opening the work of reconstruction.

HON. MR. LEMIEUX READY TO ANSWER ANY ATTACK

OTTAWA, Jan. 16.—Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, postmaster-general, arrived at Ottawa this evening from his trip to South Africa. He was asked if it was true that he would return to London in connection with the Charing Cross Bank affair. In reply, he said: "You may give a most emphatic denial to the rumor. My political enemies dragged my name into that affair. I shall wait to see if they attack me in parliament. Any statement I have to make will be made there."

MISSING BALLOONIST'S BODIES ARE FOUND

BERLIN, Jan. 16.—The German balloon Hildbrand which has been missing since its ascent at Schmagendorf on Dec. 29, was found in a Lake in Pomerania Province, Prussia, today. The bodies of both aeronauts were in the Gondola.

It had been believed that they had met death in the Baltic Sea, the balloon having taken that direction on rising. The aeronauts had planned a forty-eight hours aerial voyage and nothing was seen of them after the start.

BANK WRECKER GETS LIGHT SENTENCE

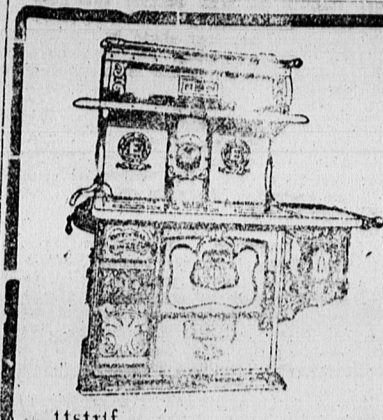
TORONTO, Jan. 16.—W. R. Travers, who wrecked the Farmers' Bank, was today sentenced to six years' imprisonment. Travers was very dejected when he came into court and looked relieved when he heard the penalty, which is generally regarded as being reasonably light, although the prisoner is 57 years of age. Magistrate Denison in passing sentence made some pertinent comments on the need of Government inspection of monetary institutions. If Travers had received the limits for the three offences to which he pleaded guilty, he would have got twenty-one years.
