### 1 Million Rubles For English Pound

HALIFAX, January 27.—A sailor who refused an easy chance to become a millionaire arrived here on the Canadian government mail steamer, Marine Star, from Canada Sunday after a voyage to Novorossiisk, in the northeast corner of the Black Sea, where the vessel delivered cargo of Canadian built railway cars for the Russian government, banded at Montreal last fall.

"Yes, sir, a member of my crew was offered 1,000,000 rubles for one English pound in that Russian port, but he refused it," said an old J. F. Pauline, manager of the steamer today. "I myself received 750,000 rubles for one pound, but you could not get the value of a ruble from day to day."

Union in Novorossiisk, according to Captain Pauline, was that the Soviet government was a bloodless revolution and that eventually a representative government would be established. Business appeared to be so brisk, but food was scarce, and everybody was pessimistic about the future of Russia, except the official propagandists of the Soviets.

### Conference Must Include Belgium

BRESLENS, January 27.—Premier Thunberg, in an interesting interpellation in the Chamber of Deputies today regarding the Geneva conference said Belgium must be represented there even if the conference had only one chance in a hundred for success. Everybody here declared, because Belgian prosperity was not founded solely upon German reparations payments, which would bring home Belgium for only one fifth of her reparations expenditures, but upon general prosperity.

### Strychnine Was In Beauty Powder

TORONTO, January 27.—The "beauty powder" which Anderson Buchanan, a young Toronto law student, swallowed in the morning of January 18, just before sitting down to breakfast in his home was strychnine. Government Analyst Dr. Joslyn L. Rogers testified at the coroner's inquest, which began an explanation of the young man's death. Marjorie Buchanan, a sister of the deceased, a school girl of 11 years, as well as her mother, testified that Anderson straitjacketed on the floor and died within 15 minutes after taking what he identically believed to be his favorite favorite hair blouses. Dr. Rogers said he found a full grain of strychnine in the stomach part of the intestines. It followed, he said, that much more than a grain of strychnine was present in the body. Half a grain, said the doctor, was usually fatal for an adult human being.

Members of the family testified that the poison came in a small envelope enclosed with directions for taking in a regular business size envelope and addressed in type to Mrs. Buchanan, mother of the deceased. After reading the directions Mrs. Buchanan poured the powder into a cup and later the envelope and accompanying sheet into the fire. The witnesses agreed that the envelope bore a postmark and also a postage stamp, indicating that it had been shipped through the letter slot by the postman.

Six witnesses testified three of them in factors, but at no time was any testimony given which would throw any new light on the tragedy. The inquest was adjourned until Monday next.

### Quebec Liberal Caucus A LOUDEST ABOUT FRANCHISE TO WOMEN.

QUEBEC, Jan. 28.—A love feast" stated Premier Taschereau after the Liberal caucus this morning. The caucus was attended by nearly all the members of both houses.

The first question taken up was the women's vote. Very few were in favor of the electoral franchise extended to women in this province and finally a suggestion was made that a referendum might be held, which was left for further consideration.

The big item of the day was in new road policy. This measure was favored by the majority of the delegation.

Regarding amendment to the liquor law, a few suggestions were made by the Prime Minister and Hon. J. L. Perron and it was agreed to hold a caucus at the end of next week to discuss the question.

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Premier Thunberg said Belgium was always ready to consider arrangements enabling Germany to pay, particularly if the other Allies would make concessions, but she would never abandon the principle of Belgian priority, which the Allies should support, since the first payments British and United States loans. He recognized advantages of face-to-face conferences, but he discussed had been thoroughly studied beforehand.

Announcement was made by the Premier that as a result of negotiations with Sir Robert S. Herne, the British Chancellor of the Exchequer, an agreement in principle had been reached with the British Government for the consideration of the Belgian debt to Great Britain and that a definite agreement was certain on similar negotiations proceeding at Washington conducted by the Belgian ambassador.

"I am convinced," said Mr. Thunberg, "that our friends will be sincerely desirous to furnish us not less than our English friends have brought us. I would be surprised if we should look in vain for proof of solidarity from the great nation which has given so much since the memorable days of 1914."

### Oil Burning Liner Montcalm Had Successful Trip

ST. JOHN, N. B., Jan. 28.—A general delight was expressed by both passengers and crew with the sea-going qualities of the new P. S. oil burning liner Montcalm which arrived here today from Liverpool on her maiden voyage across the Atlantic. High winds and heavy seas on the North Atlantic combined to make the initial voyage of the Montcalm an exacting test upon her as a seaboat.

From all accounts she appears to have come through with flying colors. G. S. Webster, R. D. R. N., is the commander of the new ship which is one of three recently completed oil burning ships for Liverpool-Canadian service. The Montcalm will ply between Liverpool and St. John until the latter part of April when she will make her first port of call on this side of the Atlantic.

The steamer on her first trans-Atlantic trip brought to St. John 229 passengers, 124 cabin and 93 third class. Most of them were for Upper Canada and the West with a few for China and Japan. They left tonight on a special train enroute to their destination.

Among the passengers on the Montcalm was Dr. C. H. Harris, Ottawa, who was returning from London after completing arrangements for the trip to Canada of the band of His Majesty's Scots Guards. The band will tour Canada under the auspices of the Great War Veterans' Association and under the direction of Dr. Harris.

General G. H. Dean and Mrs. Dean of Sydney, Australia, were also on board. They are travelling chiefly for their health and have spent several months in England. While in Canada, however, General Dean will interview officers of the Canadian R.F.C. Association with a view to having a Canadian team sent out to Australia for a series of matches with Australian rifleman. General Dean served at Gallipoli with the Anzacs and he also served in Egypt and the Near East.

Other travellers to distant destinations were Dr. and Mrs. J. W. Neill, who are returning to Tientsin, China, where the Doctor has been practicing his profession for about twenty years.

### London to New York in 18 hours by Air ship

LONDON, Jan. 28.—An airship with a speed of 215 miles an hour and able to travel from New York to London in 18 hours, using a vacuum instead of gas, is now under construction in Italy, according to advice received in London today. The airship is the invention of Sig. nor Vanzoni. His announcement has created immense excitement in aviation circles in Europe. The inventor claims that it will not only revolutionize aerial warfare but the air transport as well.

Instead of using inflammable gas to make the airship rise, Vanzoni has created a vacuum inside the envelope by means of pumps worked by engines which also propel the craft. This principle has been sought by inventors for hundreds of years unsuccessfully because the models always collapsed owing to the enormous atmospheric pressure.

Vanzoni claims that he will overcome this difficulty by building the airship in three sections, one inside the other. The space between the outside covering and the first interior will be exhausted of a portion of its air, and the next still more and the centre compartment will be made as near a vacuum as possible. In this manner the outside atmospheric pressure is distributed over three surfaces, and is reduced to less than five pounds per square inch on any portion of the ship.

Four engines of 300 horse power each burning heavy oil instead of gasoline will reduce the fire risk. By increasing or decreasing the vacuum with the pumps the ship will rise or fall at will.
