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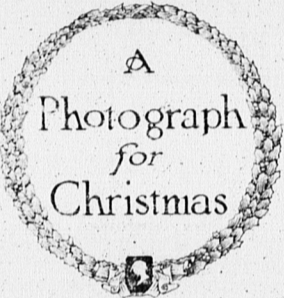

### BELCOURT MAY SOON ASSUME OFFICE IN STATES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—If the Canadian government will permit, Napoleon Antoine Belcourt is to resign his place in the senate, which is of life tenure, his appointment as the first minister from the dominion government to the United States will soon be announced, according to a view held in Washington.

It is understood here that the dominion is prepared to vote a generous appropriation for the new embassy. This consideration, according to the view held in Washington, will no longer postpone the appointment.

The fact that the Canadian cabinet meets next Tuesday, considered in connection with the very strong intimations that Belcourt will be named—as given by Canadian minister of defense Graham in his address last Tuesday in New York—is held to be responsible for the revival of the report in Canada that the appointment may be announced by Premier Mackenzie King next week.
