NERVOUSNESS RUINS FIRST BID FOR TITLE

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PORTHCAWLE, Wales, May 17.—Mrs. A. M. Holm, former Scottish title holder, today became the British Women's Golf champion, defeating Pam Barton, a nervous English school girl playing in her first championship, 6 and 5 in the 36 hole final.

The 17 year old Miss Barton continued her sensational advances in the championship right through the first 18 holes of the final round, leading Mrs. Holm, who is ten years older, two up.

After that she cracked under the strain of excitement over the prospects of winning the title on her first attempt, and her steadier and more experienced opponent slowly erased the deficit in the afternoon round, winning three of the first four holes to swing into the lead. Mrs. Holm was five up at the three-quarter mark and closed out the match on the 31st green.

Miss Barton dashed her rival in the morning when her performance on the greens. She putted straight for the cup on every green and negotiated a half stroke at the 13th. Her boldness was not always successful, however, and on the 18th she tapped a long putt far past the hole and failed to can the return putt, finally losing the hole to Mrs. Holm.

Klein Wallops Two Homers As Mates Pound Phila. Hurlers For Twenty Hits

By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 17.—New York Giants celebrated their safe return from the perils of a western tour which saw them drop from first to fourth place by whipping Cincinnati Reds 6-3 today in the first game of a long home stand. The victory failed to improve their position as the third-place Cardinals also won.

Big Fred Fitzsimmons was the leading performer for New York. Pitching his third complete game and third victory of the season, he set down the Reds with eight hits, half of them after he eased up in the last two innings. He also closed a home run in the third. New York put the game away by batting Elias Johnson to cover with a three-run assault in the fifth.

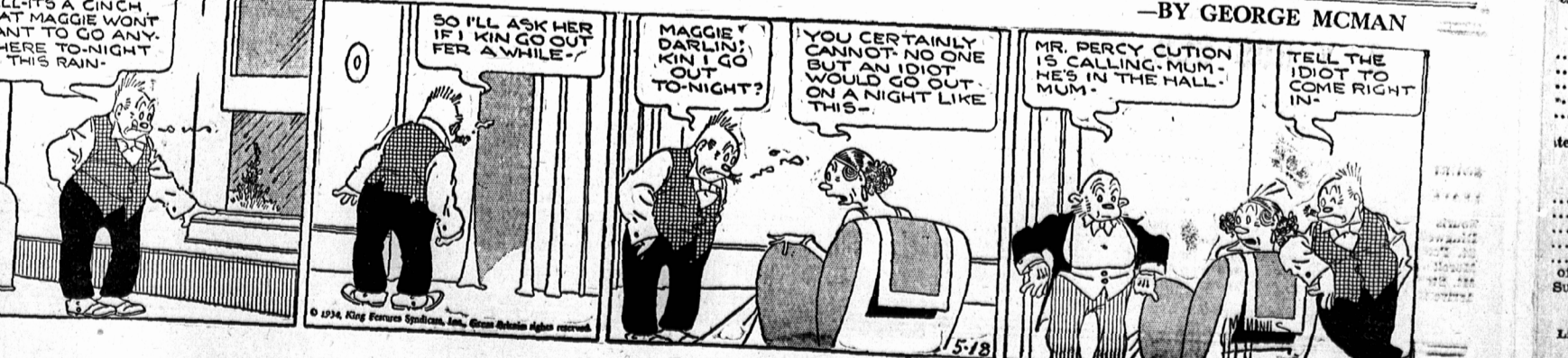
