Bernard Shaw's Rib-Tickling Comedy "Pygmalion" At Prince Edward

Lavishly mounted, superbly directed, and with Leslie Howard and the new acting "find", Wendy Hiller, offering two of the finest acting portrayals seen on the screen in some time, "Pygmalion", a dramatization of the Bernard Shaw comedy hit, opened yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre to provide audiences with entertainment brimming with laughter and human interest.

The story of "Pygmalion" revolves about Henry Higgins, a professor of phonetics, who on a bet takes Eliza Doolittle, a drab flower seller, out of the London slums and trains her in correct speaking, deportment and social graces with the intention of passing her off as a duchess at an ambassadorial reception. His experiment is a complete success. But now that Eliza is no longer a flower girl nor really a duchess, her problems have actually begun and it is in the outcome of these that the story reaches a surprising and unforgettable denouement.

There is movement and suspense from the opening shot to the closing reel of "Pygmalion," with the action developing smoothly and convincingly under the brilliant direction of Anthony Asquith and Leslie Howard. The Shaw dialogue is not only witty but natural, the characterizations are shrewd and penetrating.

Leslie Howard has never been better than in his role of the cold-blooded phonetics professor, making the character real and human, and a new screen star of rare beauty and distinction has been born in Wendy Hiller, cast as the flower girl. Also outstanding in the superb cast are Wilfred Lawson and Marie Lohr.

"Pygmalion" is grand entertainment and will make audiences laugh as they have not laughed since the old Chaplin comedies.

The order for dismissal was made on motion of the plaintiff.

FINED AND SHOT GUN CONFISCATED—Yesterday afternoon a party appeared before Justice of the Peace J. J. MacChilvar at Vernon, charge under the Migratory Birds Convention Act, with hunting black ducks in closed season. He pleaded guilty and a fine of thirty dollars and costs of thirty days in jail was imposed by the Justice. The shot gun was ordered confiscated. The above was the sequel to the incident at Avondale late in the evening of May 17th when game officers apprehended the accused in a swamp in the act of hunting black ducks. The case was prosecuted by the R. O. M. P.
