**SUCCESS INSTITUTE.** Twelve regular meetings were held during the year. Average attendance, 14. Receipts, for the year \$366.33, expenditures, \$314.18; \$52 was expended on support of a prisoner of war; \$20.00 on Halifax Relief Fund; for wool and yarn \$136.24; 127 pairs of socks were knit, and sewing included 15 sheets, 16 pillow cases, 9 hospital shirts, 32 towels, 32 boxes were sent overseas.

**SYDNEY VISITORS.** Mr. D. J. McNeill, mechanical Superintendent of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, Sydney, C. B., is visiting Charlottetown, accompanied by Mrs. McNeill. This is Mr. McNeill's second visit to the Island, the previous being twelve years ago. He reports that business in Sydney is booming in all lines. The principal business is being done in shell steel and the manufacturing of rails which are sent to all parts of the Province.

**WORK ON THE P. E. I. R.** The Railway has a staff of workmen busily employed clearing ditches, laying ties and putting down a new telegraph line. The telegraph line between here and Borden is now about completed and the principal work on this is being done west of Summerside and east of Royalty Junction. The railway has now a total of about sixty thousand railway ties on hand and about 11,000 a week are being received by the S. C. Scotia. The great difficulty is to get the labor to put them in place. Two ballast trains have been out for a week and have secured enough ballast at Perth for the Borden branch. One of the greatest difficulties the railway men has to contend with is to get a suitable ballast. Supt. Grady says there is a gold mine for one who can get a suitable ballast pit in P. E. Island.

**ABLE SERMON.** Rev. Dr. Abbott Smith of Montreal was the preacher in St. Peter's Cathedral on Sunday evening and preached a very scholarly and impressive discourse his text being selected from the Book of Job. He dealt with the manner in which a righteous man was singled out for affliction for no apparent reason and Job's unshaken trust in the mercy of God in the face of all his miseries. The preacher made a comparison to some extent of the times in which Job lived to those of today when sorrow is coming into many homes and the innocent in many lands are suffering the loss of homes and everything dear to them on earth. Job's faith found amply justified and the lesson conveyed was that while it may not be discerned or understood why affliction should come to the innocent yet this chastening in time will be over-ruled for good and bring about a desirable condition.
