**WAR AS AN EDUCATOR.**

War is a great educator in many ways. It gives us an intense interest in countries, cities and places which before were regarded almost with indifference. The Boer war for instance, turned a great search light upon the previous obscurity of South Africa and made us familiar with Cape Town, Durban, Bloemfontein, Pretoria, Ladysmith, with the Tugela and Modder rivers, with the Boer people and the Kaffirs. The interest was heightened no doubt by the fact, that Britain was a party to the fight and our own Canadian soldiers were engaged in it, but the chief interest was in the fact that many men were engaged in a life and death struggle and were paying the last full measure of devotion to a cause of which they believed to be right and just. In like manner the war in the Philippines turned the search light of publicity and the earnest gaze of the civilized world to those far off islands where the day begins.

And now it is the struggle between Russia and Japan which is affording the world a great object lesson in geography, in manners and customs, in courage and patriotism. It has already made Japan, Korea and Manchuria, Tokio, Nagasaki, Pusan, Seoul, Chemulpo, Port Arthur, Vladivostok, Dairen, Lio Yang, Mukden, the Yalu river and the Yellow Sea familiar as household words to the reading public of all civilized lands. In point of distance these lands, waters and cities are at the very ends of the earth. The intensity of interest created by the war struggle has brought them near. The cables and the press have brought us tidings of surpassing interest touching the great conflict, and we have come to realize how much we have in common with the men of the struggling hosts, Russian and Japanese, how human they are in their courage, their patriotism, their sufferings and their weaknesses—that they are in fact very like ourselves and brothers in the great brotherhood of humanity.

There is so much of death and destruction, of suffering and loss in war, that it is well there should be some compensations. One of these is that we are learning more about the Far East: in three months of war than we should have learned in thirty years of peace. How greatly our interest in and knowledge of Japan and the Japanese have been stimu-

lated and informed by the struggle now going on we cannot estimate. Courage, skill, careful preparation, resourcefulness and a patriotism more intense than the world had before known have been exemplified and have won our admiration. And the lesson will never be wholly lost. The entire western world will hereafter look upon the East with a new and clearer vision. Trade with the east will expand and missionary enterprises will be intelligently stimulated and better directed. The great family of nations will know each other better. The day will be hastened when there shall be no foreign lands. Perhaps, when the world comes to understand fully the meaning of the present war it may be found to be a necessary preparatory step toward the day when war shall cease and the federation of the world shall come.

Grover Cleveland's endorsement of Judge Parker for the Democratic candidature renders his nomination for President by the national convention highly probable. Mr. Cleveland was known to have a personal liking for both Judge Gray and Mr. Olney, but in a recent interview declared Judge Parker to be "the man upon whom the conservative element of the party could and ought to concentrate." He added, "I knew him to be a first-class, honest, safe and manly man." The convention will include 904 delegates, two thirds of which number will be necessary to secure a nomination. The names of Parker, German, Olney, Wall, Hearst and Bryan are likely to go before the convention. Parker has at this writing the largest number of instructed delegates. A large proportion of the delegates are uninstructed and consequently free to make their own choice. The convention will meet in St. Louis.

**Fagin's Kitchen.**
