Annual Meeting "Y" Men's Club

Following is the reports of the Y's Men's Club, which has had a most successful year.

PRESIDENT REPORT

Charlottetown, P.E.I. Dec 2, 1926 Fellow Y's Men:—

It has indeed been a great privilege to preside over a club of this kind for the past twelve months. This club as you all are aware was organized just one year ago, since then forty-three new clubs have been added to the organization, altogether there are one hundred and thirty-three clubs reaching out into three continents and four countries. There are one hundred and twenty-five clubs in North America and twenty-two in Canada. The first Canadian clubs were formed in Sydney and Vancouver about two years ago. The organization was founded in Toledo, Ohio, by Paul Alexander five years ago.

This is one of the many clubs that calls for service. Therefore this evening I desire to turn to some of the activities in which we can largely figure in our work. I believe that every Y's man should be sold on this principle of service. This club is rendering a service when it keeps its members informed of immediate civic and social interests, by bringing to the club speakers from the community who can give us such information, and we can render service in our community by being interested and taking an unselfish part whenever necessary in civic affairs.

We can render service by developing character. Character is one of the most valued assets of life, and what service work could be greater than developing young men of character. We can support by active service philanthropic and social movements. I am coming now to the most important service of this club and that is the service we should render actively, personally, and by united effort for the "Y. M. C. A." and its program.

There are many different ways in which we can serve, but I earnestly believe that this club should have one particular service hobby to which we cling.

In regard to the working of this club we did not obtain as much cooperation from some of the different committees as we could expect. A few fell down in their jobs completely. I also would like to remind the executive for the coming year to help the president by attending every meeting he may call. During this last year I am sorry to have to complain of the difficulty of securing all the members of the executive to attend meetings called.

I think there is one thing this club should try and avoid, and that is the making of any motion that can not be carried out, when motions are not put into effect it has a tendency to dampen the zeal of the members and may have a disastrous effect on our work, if any complaints are to be made it should be brought to the notice of the club and not talked of too freely by the members outside.

You can help the officers a great deal by bringing all matters to the club to deal with, of course we all realize that the past year was an experimental year with us and we are glad of the progress we have made, and trust our fallings this year will be warning for the coming years of service.

We have made this a place where we can come and spend an hour or more away from our office or business place and forget our work, where the oldest mix with the youngest with the utmost intimacy and where every member is always ready to help the other fellow.

The falling of goodwill manifested in our club propels itself into every walk in life, whenever or wherever "Y's men" meet their greetings are as brothers. I am glad to note that since we opened our winter term the club has been so active.

Before closing my report I want to express my appreciation to all the officers and committees who have shown their co-operation during the year. Especially do I thank Jim Farquharson, our present secretary and Peter Campbell who retired in May, for their loyalty and helpfulness, also Percy Turner who has helped the club so well.
