Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family or any state over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must be a person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Outlets—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along a river or lake. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties Six months residence in each of three years after obtaining homestead patent, also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Six months in each of three years on the land, and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction. Stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Oh it is hard to think that we shall meet no more in this world.

He enlisted because it was his duty and knew full well what was awaiting him. We have prayed and will continue to pray for him, and also that God may console you and your family in your great affliction.

Dear Mr. MacDougall:—
You will no doubt be surprised to hear from me but I feel it my duty to extend to you my deepest sympathy in the loss you have sustained in the death of your dear son Jack, who was killed in action on August 14th. We were all grieved to hear of his death. Your son and my brother were pals and I sent their last leave previous to going overseas at our home and by his sterling qualities endeared himself to all who knew him. He was a thorough gentleman in every respect and was loved and esteemed by everyone. He taught a term or two in our school in Revere Qui Barre, Alberta, where he made a host of friends.

How vividly I can recall to mind his last Sunday here and picture him saying, "that it was about time he was going home to his country. Alas! how little we thought that he would again would he set foot in sunny Alberta. However it matters little when or where we are called upon to make the supreme sacrifice as long as we are prepared to meet our Judge, and you may rest assured he was prepared.

Your dear son was with me in the same Battalion with my brother and when sent overseas they were both drafted into the 10 Battalion, but they were together only a short time when my poor brother was killed and Jack wrote us such a lovely letter of condolence which I shall ever cherish as a lasting memorial of them both.

I also had a grand letter from him written on the 14th of August the day previous to the battle in which he was killed.

Well Mr. MacDougall I could tell you so many nice things about poor Jack, what a dear boy he was and while it makes the loss still greater there is a whole lot of consolation in the fact that he was just as good as a boy could be and I'll remember him always as being one of the best I ever knew.

I was not sure of your address and had written to Ottawa to get it, that accounts for my long delay in writing to you. Your dear son was killed in an attack on Loos and my brother was killed in a dugout back of Vimy Ridge by an enemy shell. Concussion of the shell bursting, death was instantaneous with him.

There is rather a strange coincidence between them. My brother was listed in May and Jack in July, my brother was sent to France in April and Jack, your son, in June, one met death in June the other in August. Just two months in each case. It is rather strange but I suppose such things will happen.

Well Mr. MacDougall there is certainly a terrible war raging on the Continent a war that has brought grief to many and many homes, but we should try and take it as the Lord intended that we should and be heroes at home as our dear ones were heroes in a foreign land and we shall pray for them that through their intercession we may gain eternal happiness. I certainly felt that you were called upon to make great sacrifice and sympathize with you with a heart full of sympathy. Last week I had masses said for both of the dear boys for your son was to us like my own darling brother. Now though we feel the loss of our beloved ones so keenly, we must console ourselves during those of their enjoying a martyr's crown in Heaven and in a very short time, when all is over we may entertain the hope of seeing them in that beautiful beyond where we shall be reunited.

Now, I shall conclude hoping you will receive this in due course. I beg to remain a friend of Jack.

Under the Military Service Act, 1917, bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before January 1st, 1917, MUST report for service or claim exemption, on or before

November 10th, 1917

All that is needed immediately is for the report or claim to be made on the forms obtainable at any Post Office in Canada, and left with the Postmaster for transmission. Every man in Class One must report for service or claim exemption not later than Saturday.

Apple Turnovers

Put 1 pint of flour into a bowl, add ½ teaspoon of salt, 2 level teaspoons of baking powder; mix thoroughly, then rub into the mixture 1 tablespoon of butter and add sufficient milk to make a soft dough. Roll out in a sheet ½ inch thick; cut with a biscuit cutter into circles. Put 2 tablespoons of stewed apples on half the dough; fold over the other half, push the edges together, place there in a baking pan, brush with little milk and bake for 20 minutes.
