The Guardian has received word of the sudden death of James Grigg, West Devon, at the age of eighty-seven. No particulars or date of death were furnished.

The above mentioned instructors attended the Infantry School of Training at Halifax last summer where they passed very successfully.

Both the St. John morning papers give nearly two column reports of the Rev. J. L. Batty's address in Keith's Nickel Theatre, here on Sunday afternoon. His subject was "The Temere Decree and its Effect on Canadian Citizenship." The meeting was held under the auspices of Johnston Lodge, L. O. A., and many prominent Orangemen were on the platform. Rev. Mr. Batty discussed the provisions of the decree and urged the need of a federal marriage law and a law making it "a criminal offence for any outsider to interfere between husband and wife to break up the home life."—Exc. Charles W. MacRae has been appointed councillor in the city of Alameda, Cal., to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Councilman Peter Christensen. The appointment was made by Mayor Noy, and ratified by the city council. Mr. MacRae is a native of Prince Edward Island, has resided in Alameda for twenty-three years, and has always been prominently identified with the building and contracting business in that city.—Oakland Maple Leaf.

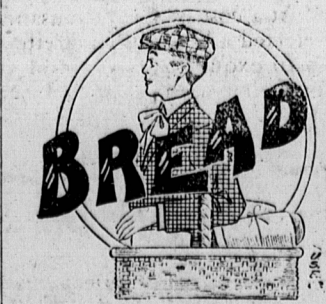
Aneas A. Macdonald, Barrister, Charlottetown, was a passenger on the mail special last evening en route to Montreal where he will meet the remains of his father, the late Senator Macdonald, who passed away at Ottawa yesterday at 1.00 p. m., as referred to on page one of this issue. Mr. Macdonald received the first intimation of his father's illness about a week ago and on Monday received a telegram informing him that the Senator was improving. Senator Macdonald left for Ottawa last November, and apart from an attack of rheumatism which enfeebled him, was in his usual health. The funeral will take place in Charlottetown on Tuesday.

It became known today that R. B. Kessen, general manager of the Bank of New Brunswick, had resigned. The resignation had been handed to the directors four or five weeks ago, but has not yet been acted on. It is Mr. Kessen's intention to leave St. John. Mr. Kessen, who has had large experience in other Canadian cities, succeeded W. H. Stavert as general manager of the bank, and has pursued an active policy, with the best results. While local business increased, a large outside business has been created through the establishment of branches in many places in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. The bank was the first to increase the annual dividend rate to 15 per cent. The capital stock has been largely increased. A branch of the bank was recently opened in Montreal with excellent prospects, and altogether the institution is in an excellent position. Mr. Kessen's departure will be a heavy loss to banking circles and the business community. A successor to Mr. Kessen has not yet been selected.—St. John Exc. (W. H. Stavert referred to is a native of this province.)

Among the visitors to the Golden West during the past month says the California, Oakland, Maple Leaf, was M. E. Smith, the well known plastering contractor of Minneapolis, who had been enjoying a pleasant vacation through the Southern and Western States, going as far south as Mexico. Mr. Smith left for home by way of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and will stop a short time in Souris, Manitoba, where his brother Philip and Mrs. Smith reside.

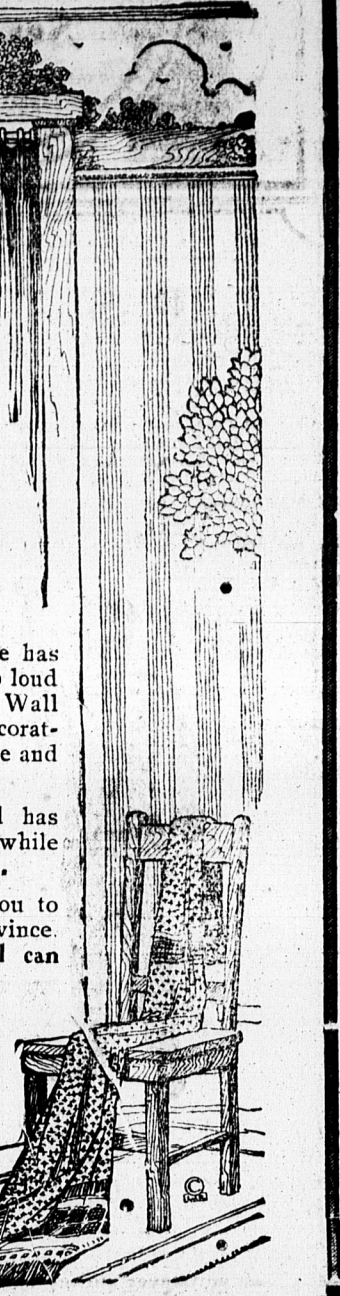
