JOINS JESUITS.—The following clipping is taken from the Boston Globe of recent date: "Harry MacLeod, only son of Dr. and Mrs. Harry P. MacLeod of 173 Norfolk St., Dorchester, will enter the Society of Jesus. He will leave for New York to-day and on Tuesday enter the Jesuit novitiate at St. Andrew-on-the-Hudson. MacLeod is a graduate of the Roger Wolcott Grammar School and Boston College High School, graduating from the latter last June with honors. At high school he took a prominent part in the oratorical and dramatic lines. For two years he took an important part in the high school play and last season he was in the "Passion Play." He has been an altar boy at St. Matthew's Church, Dorchester, for a number of years. Mr. MacLeod referred to is a nephew of Messrs. William and Frank Payne, Charlottetown. His grandfather was the late Mr. James MacLeod who at one time conducted a tailoring business in Charlottetown with Mr. John T. McKenzie, under the firm name of Messrs. MacLeod and McKenzie.

TROUBLES OF A SCHOONER.—Says the North Sydney Herald: Owing to some misunderstanding, or a desire on the part of some of the interested parties to get rich quick, the coal laden schooner Glyndon was delayed in the stream one day this week several hours while two of the crew fought the matter out with Captain W. J. Kennedy, whom they claimed owned each of them two hundred dollars back wages. The trouble arose when Kennedy disposed of his vessel to R. J. McNeil, a merchant residing at Tyne Valley, P. E. I. The latter, after purchasing money, loaded the vessel with coal, and put as he was ready for sea was approached by the two former crew of the Glyndon, who put in their claim of \$400. Mr. McNeil was surprised, as he purchased the vessel with the full understanding and agreement that she was entirely free from debt. The two men interested talked the matter over with the solicitor employed by the vessel, when the P. E. I. steamer threatened to take criminal action against Kennedy, charging obtaining money under false pretences, unless the men were paid their money. This was followed by the threat of demurrage against Kennedy for loss of the vessel's time. For a time there was neither give nor take, but finally Kennedy paid the men their money and the vessel proceeded to sea. Since the above appeared in the Sydney Herald the Glyndon has come to grief on the Tryon Shoals with her cargo. She was badly pounded by the recent heavy seas and it is likely that both vessel and cargo will be a total loss. The former is insured, but not the latter. The cargo consists of 210 tons of coal. This vessel was only bought a few days ago and was on her first trip to the island, in command of Captain Louis Razavett. Captain and crew reached shore safely.

The vessel, formerly in the great lakes service, was on her way to an Atlantic port to be remodelled into an ocean tug."—The Racine it will be remembered called at Charlottetown on August 10th and sailed on the 11th after taking on supplies of coal, water and provisions. She was then on her way from Chicago to New York to be converted into a tug for towing barges to France.

ANOTHER ISLANDER KILLED IN ACTION.—Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm Matheson, Bradalbane, have received official announcement that their youngest son, Pte. Angus Matheson was killed in action on August 5th. Pte. Matheson, who was 23 years of age at the time of his death, enlisted in the 105th Battalion and after going to England was drafted into the 11th Battalion and was one of the first of the battalion to cross to France. He had written home regularly some of his letters being received after the date of his death. He was a splendid type of man physically and mentally and the sincere sympathy of all goes out to the bereaved parents, brothers and sisters. There are left to mourn five brothers and three sisters, namely, John and Campbell in Massachusetts, Alexander in Victoria, B. C., Murdoch and John R., in military service in France; Mrs. J. W. 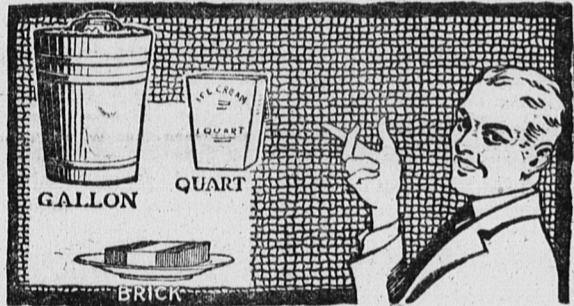

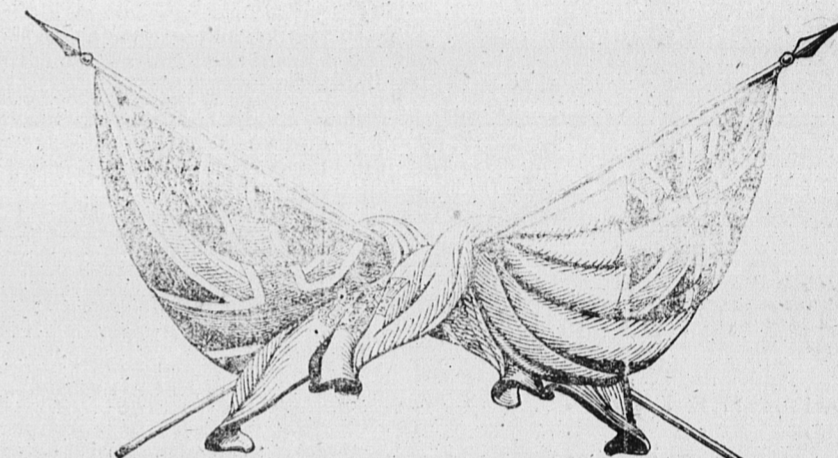
