

OPENING OF THE BAPTIST ORGAN

The Organ Recital in the Baptist Church in this city, held last evening was a most auspicious event, marking as it did, one of the most progressive steps that congregation has taken for the past number of years—the addition of a magnificent new Casavant Pipe Organ, the only of that make in this city—to their church equipment.

Those who heard it could not but congratulate the Organ committee—A. F. Webster, Dr. I. J. Yeo, Rev. Z. L. Fish and A. W. Stearns—on the excellence of their choice of an instrument. The organ spoke well for its makers. It is finely balanced and suited to the capacity of the room. In the Great Organ there are four stops: Open Diapason, Melodia, Dulciana and Principal. In the Organ there are seven stops: Open Diapason, Stopped Diapason, Viola Di Gamba, Aeoline, Vix Celeste, Harmonic Flute and Oboe. On the Pedal Organ there is the Bassoon. The organ is fitted with Tablet Couplers, Great to Pedal, Swell to Pedal, Swell to Great Unison, Swell to Great Sub, Swell to Great Super, and Great Super, and Great Super and Tremolo. The Combination Pedals are piano and forte on the Great.
